Region's COVID-19 cases now at 1,464

DOH confirms two new deaths due to virus

TACLOBAN CITY- As the coronavirus disease 2019(COVID-19) cases continue to balloon in the region, the Department of Health(DOH) confirms of two new deaths due to the dreaded virus.

The two COVID-19 deaths of the region involved a 74-year old woman from Dulag town and an 80-year old man from Ormoc City.

With this latest deaths, the region has now six confirmed COVID-19 fatalities.

Dr. Exuperia Sabalberino, DOH assistant regional director, said that the 80-year old man, a locally stranded individual, died on August 7.

His swab result came Leyte province. out after his death.

Meantime, the 74-year old woman died on August

11, the day her swab result was released.

Both were suffering from pre-existing medical conditions and were buried immediately, Sabalberino said during a virtual press conference on Wednesday (August 12).

The DOH in the region has earlier confirmed COVID-19 deaths from the towns of Tarangan and Calbayog City, both in Samar province; Kawayan, Biliran province; and Kananga,

Dead dolphin found in Biliran waters

As online teaching starts this school year

Students using Chinese or Korean characters as FB names ask to use real names

TACLOBAN CITY-Some students enrolled in this year's school year may have to be compelled to change their Facebook account particularly names, those using Chinese or Korean characters.

For this year's school term, students, especially in college and secondary levels, will be resorting to online method of teaching.

The change of method of teaching for this school year, which will formally opened on August 24, was part of the campaign of the national government to address the growing number of disease coronavirus 2019(COVID-19) cases in the country.

For teacher Jocelyn Tualla Balagusa, who handles Grade 12 students at the Leyte National High School (LNHS), based this city, she would be requiring her students who are using Chinese or Korean characters as their FB names or accounts to use their real and complete names beginning first day of classes.

She said that considering that all her students will be required to go online, it would be difficult for her to 'locate' them if they are using these characters.

"We teachers will be creating our group chats or FB page. How can we add or locate them (students) if they are using these Chinese characters," Tualla Balagusa said.

She said that last school year, out of the 45 students she had, only five of them were using their real names.

LNHS is the biggest secondary school in Eastern Visayas biggest with more than 8,000 enrollment.

"So what I did was to call them through their mobile phones," Tualla Balagusa, who is handling nine sections in Grade 12 teaching HUMSS (humanities social sciences), said.

And calling her stu-

dents instead of 'messaging' them on their Facebook accounts entail additional expense on her part as she need more 'load,' Tualla Balagusa said.

Lemuel Dave, a Grade 11 student at LNHS, said that it is okay for him to change his FB account using his

But the problem, he said, it would take 60 days for him to do that.

"I would love to but still I have to wait until 60 days to change it again," the 16-year old student said.

He has been using his account with Chinese characters for more than eight months now.

The student explained that under the guidelines of Facebook, one can change or replaced his or her account only after the lapse of 60 days or two months.

Heeven Kyle Abiertas, a Grade 9 student, said that he resorted to using Chinese characters as he was 'bored' when he created his Facebook account.

"That's ok. I will just create another FB account using my real name," the 14-year old student of San Jose National High School, said, adding that he would still continue to use his FB account with the Chinese character.

It's not clear yet why using Chinese or Korean characters became a fad of sort among young FB users.

But Queen Sofia,14, said that she noticed that almost all of her friends and classmates switched into using Chinese or Korean characters as their FB account names last year.

"We would like to avoid our accounts being hacked or attacked by trolls that is why I and my friends decided to use these characters as our FB accounts," the Grade 9 student of LNHS, said.

She too, favor to use their real names for this

Tacloban city govt appoints personnel as part of its intensified COVID -19 contract tracing

TACLOBAN CITY-In hopes of speeding up the contact tracing and surveillance process of suspected coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) and other infectious diseases carriers at the community level, the city government of Tacloban convened the 40 designated Persons of Authority (POA) in an orientation on Wednesday, August 12 at the City Engineer's Office (CEO) Gym.

The POAs, who are all local government employees and currently living in the northern part of the City, will lead the Volunteer Surveillance Officers (VSO), composed of Barangay Health Nutrition Scholars, Barangay Service Point Officers, and other volunteers at the community who have signed up to help the government address this health crisis.

Meantime, Acting City Health Officer Dr. Gloria Fabrigas has appealed to the employees to be more involved in the contact tracing, stressing that it is not

"We mobilize them in order to engage and empower the community, especially in the North, wherein there are more than 16,000 families living in the resettlement areas, " she explained.

Fabrigas stressed that the PAOs, in coordination with the VSOs, are tasked to trace those who have been in close contact with the COVID-19 suspected and confirmed patients.

With 41 cases, Basey village now a hot spot of COVID-19 pandemic

TACLOBAN An upland interior village in Basey town, Samar province, has now become a hot spot area for coronavirus disease 2019(COVID-19).

Barangay Villa Aurora, more than 10 kms away from the town center, 41 COVID-19 cases, more than half of the 70 cases of

The village first case involved a 77-year old man who is suffering from a chronic ailment and confined at the Eastern Visayas Regional Medical Center(EVRMC, this city.

On August 8, Mayor Luz Ponferrada placed the entire town of more than 1, 200 people, in a lockdown that is to end on August 21. This bars the villagers to go out Villa Aurora.

The move is to ensure that the virus would be contain. The villagers, who depend on agriculture as their livelihood, are being provided with foods by the local government unit.

The DOH said that most of the new infected people of the village were friends, relatives or family members of the 77-year

daughter and wife.

Until now, the authorities have yet to determine where the man got the virus as he was known to have no travel history.

The DOH has identified Basey, due to the rising number of COVID-19 cases in Villa Aurora, as one of the areas in the region where there is a localized cases of the dread virus.

"Since the affected barangay has been on lockdown for days, and the nearby barangays have been restricted in their movements, we are hopeful that we will get through this crisis soon," Mayor Ponferrada

Aside from Villa Aurora, also placed under lockdown were its neighboring villages of Cancaiyas and Balante.

Of the 41 COVID-19 patients of the village, 18 are already isolated at the Municipal Ligtas COVID-19 Center (MLCC), while three are confined at the EVRMC.

Dr. Ludina Insigne, DOH8 medical surveillance officer, who visited the village to gather swab samples from the identified close contacts of the early con-

old man, to include his firmed patients disclosed that during their visit, they noticed that some residents were not following the health protocols.

> "We were able to talk to village officials and reiterated to follow the lockdown imposed by the municipality because we have observed that some residents were still living their respective homes and even the village," she said.

> "We also reiterate to them the importance of following the protocol as well as for the community to cooperate to stop spreading the virus," she

> In the lockdown imposed by the municipality, minors, senior citizens and pregnant women including those with high risk of infection are prohibited from leaving their respective homes.

> Residents are also advised to continue observing and following health protocols such as wearing of face masks, physical distancing and proper handwashing, and social gathering while the village is under lockdown is prohibited.

NMP welcomes Congress move not to remove school from DOLE

TACLOBAN CITY The National Maritime Polytechnic (NMP) based here, will remain under the Department of Labor and Employment(DOLE)instead being attached to the Philippine Merchant Marine Academy(PMMA)-Visayas Extension Campus.

This after Cagayan de Oro Rep.Rufus Rodriguez withdrew his authored House Bill No. 6367 which calls for the conversion of the NMP as extension school of PMMA.

"After they have given

the position paper, I see the light that the PMMA should not anymore convert NMP to be part of them. I see their vision of being able to also open other satellite schools that they will manage. So I am now withdrawing practically my bill because in due deference and in respect to NMP who has given their position paper objecting to my bill. So, I therefore reiterate my motion to table this, meaning that it will not be discussed anymore, it's a dead bill", Rep. Rodriguez disclosed on August 7.

NMP Executive Director Joel Maglunsod welcome the decision of the Cagayan de Oro solon as he stressed his opposition to any move to detach NMP from its current mother unit, the DOLE.

"We have no objection to the vision of Congress of expanding PMMA to the Visayas and Mindanao. However, we would like to reinforce our stand that NMP as a learning institution that provides worldclass education and train-

ing to Filipinos, which purpose is aligned with the mandate of DOLE to promote gainful opportunities and develop human resources, consistent with its mandate as stipulated in Presidential Decree No. 1369", Maglunsod said.

He added that NMP is also planning to establish a satellite offices in Cebu and Mindanao to provide an alternative maritime training center that provides accessible, affordable yet quality maritime trainings. (RESTITUTO A. CAYUBIT)

And we can add that if one is known by God, he somehow already knows everything that he ought to know since God, who possesses him because he loves God, knows everything. In other words, he shares in the knowledge of God.

Manlilisid School, Javier II District, Javier Leyte is a newly-open Central School in Javier last November 2017, it is accessible by all means of transportation, it is hinter land school with total land area of 10,345 square meters. It is a mono grade school and has a population of 255 pupils handled by ten competent and dedicated teachers, each of them attended mono grade classes and a dedicated School Head. It has 11 classrooms; one classroom is newly repaired intended for dental and health clinic and two classrooms serves as School Head's office and District Head's office. All of these, the teachers, School Head, the building, the land and the pupils make their way as parts of the plan.

In terms of socio-economic status, majority of the learners belong to families whose means of parents livelihood depend mostly on coconut and rice farming. With the increase of price commodities in the market at present, most of the families could hardly afford to send their children to school especially when the price of copra and rice goes down or deflated and also the loose of abaca plants on their farm. There are times that some of the elementary school children are absent in school, they

prefer to help their parents do the house hold chores, help their parents in the farm during harvest time and some do labor to help their parents earn to supply their daily consumption in life. As a result, some of the children report to classes irregularly. With this condition, low academic performance is observed at the end of the school year.

With the collaboration

and continuous support of the school PTA and LGU to implement the DepEd programs and projects, the school is able to achieve a very satisfactory result in line with the School Based Management. Through the active leadership of the PTA President, problems of the school are being discussed and addressed then solutions are identified to address the underlying needs of the pupils to improve performance and learning outcomes of the school. On the other hand, the LGU immediately acts on all requests of the School Head for school improvement and priorities are given emphasis. This active involvement of the PTA and other stakeholders manifest a strong partnership with the school to attain our Vision, Mission and Core Values of the DepEd.

House panel approves proposed Samar Island Medical Center

TACLOBAN CITY-The proposed 300-bed capacity tertiary Samar Island Medical Center (SIMC) in Eastern Visayas is closer to becoming a reality with the approval of House Bill (HB) 1153 at the House committee level through a virtual hearing on August 12, 2020.

"The coronavirus disease (COVID-19) pandemic has highlighted the importance of an effective and comprehensive healthcare system. Government must improve our system and continue working towards accessible healthcare for all," said Tingog party-list Representative Yedda Marie Romualdez, the chairperson of the House Committee on the Welfare of Children.

In a statement, Romualdez said the proposed tertiary hospital will address the urgent medical needs of Samarnons, especially now with the threat of COVID-19.

"The island of Samar is the third largest island in the country and is also home to three provinces--Northern Samar, (Western) Samar, and Eastern Samar- and to a population of more than 2 million residents. However, there is not a single tertiary government hospital on the island," said Romualdez, who sponsored the bill along with her husband House Majority Leader and Leyte Representative Ferdinand Martin Romualdez.

"Patients and their families have to travel four to five hours from

Northern Samar, three to four hours from Eastern Samar, and two to three hours from Samar just to get to the nearest government tertiary hospital located in Tacloban (Leyte). With these three provinces already having one of the highest poverty incidence in the country, the availability of accessible and affordable hospital care is one of its most pressing needs," added the lady solon.

Citing a report from Department of Health (DOH)-Eastern Visayas Director Minerva Molon, Romualdez said the doctor to patient ratio in Samar Island's three provinces stands at 1:10,337.

The World Health Organization (WHO) has recommended a ratio of 1:1,000.

RESOLUTION NO. 44

Series of 2020

WHEREAS, waste disposal continues to be one of the most pressing concerns of the Municipality of Biri, posing a serious threat on the sanitation, health and safety its constituents, and against the ecological balance;

WHEREAS, Section 16 of RA 7160 provides that "every local government until shall XXX, within respective territorial jurisdiction, XXX and preserve the comfort and convenience of their inhabitants":

WHEREAS, Section 17 (b) (2) thereof states that every Municipality shall provide "solid waste disposal system or environment management system and services of facilities related to general hygiene and sanitation"

WHEREAS, under the pertinent provisions of Section 477 thereof, the Sangguniang Bayan is mandated to approve legislative measures to carry out such pur pose, to wit: (5) (xiii) Provide for efficient and effective system of solid waste and garbage and disposal and prohibit littering and the placing or throwing of garbage, refuse and fifth and wastes; (4) (xii) Regulate the disposal of clinical and other waste from hospitals, clinics, and other similar establishments; and, (4) (ii) Require that the building and the premises thereof and any land within the Municipality be kept and maintained in sanitary condition; imposed penalties for violation thereof

WHEREAS, on Jan. 26, 2001 Republic Act No. 9003, AN ACT PROVIDING FOR THE ECOLOGICAL SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT PROGRAM, CREATING NECESSARY INSTITUTIONAL MECHANISM AND INCENTIVES, DECLARING CERTAIN ACTS PRO-HIBITED AND PROVIDING PENALTIES, APPROPRIATING FUNDS THEREOF, AND OTH-ER PURPOSES, also known as the Ecological Solid Waste Management Act of 2000, was approved into law;

NOW THEREFORE

ORDINANCE NO. 07 Series of 2020

'AN ORDINANCE STRENGTHENING THE ECOLOGICAL SOLID WASTE MANAGE-MENT OF BIRI, NORTHERN SAMAR, ADOPTING R.A. 9003 AND PROVIDING PEN-ALTIES THEREOF"

Sponsor: MANUEL B. BERNALDEZ, SR.

BE IT ENACTED by the Sangguniang Bayan in the session duly assembled that: Section 1. Title. "An ordinance strengthening the ecological solid waste manment of Biri, Northern Samar, adopting RA 9003, providing penalties thereof.

Section 2. Coverage. This ordinance shall apply to all individuals, residential houses; establishments such as restaurants, eateries, carenderias, department stores, sari-sari stores, stalls, shops, public markets, mini-market and talipapas, slaughterhouse, hotels, recreational centers, discos, KTVs, video houses, beach institutions like hospitals, funeral parlors, schools, churches, public and private industrial establishments like factories, plants and other establishments of any kind;

Transportation facilities such as terminals, buses, jeepneys, megataxis, tircy cles, and pedicabs; parks, public open spaces and thoroughfares; and agricultural

Section 3. Definition of Terms. The following terms shall be understood as they are defined:

Agriculture wastes - refer to wastes generated from planting or harvesting of crops, trimming of pruning of plants and wastes or run-off materials from farms or field.

Biodegradable - refers to any material that can be reduced into finer particles or decomposed by microbiological organism or enzymes (synonyms with compostable).

Biogas digester - means the "poso Negro" Taiwan type of above-ground portable Valderia model. Biogas is a mixture of methane, carbon dioxide, traces of inert gases produced by the termentation of animal manure or organic waste in the airtight digester chamber.

Bulky waste - refer to wastes materials, which cannot be approriately placed in separate containers because of either its bulky size, shape or other physical attributes. These include large worn-out or broken household, commercial, and industrial item such as furniture, lamps, bookcases, filing cabinets, and other similar items

Buy-back-center - refers to a recycling center that purchase or otherwise accepts recyclable materials from the public for the purpose of recycling such materials

Compost - is a decayed organic materials for use as soil conditioner or fertilizer.

Composting - is a biological degradation under controlled conditions; the process of making biodegradable such as food waste, garden waste, animal waste, human waste, into composed by mixing them with soild, water, biological additives/ activitors (optional) and air.

Consumer electronics - refers to special wastes that include worn-out broken, and other discarded items such as radios, stereos, and TV sets.

Disposal - refers to the discharge, deposit, dumping, spilling, leaking or placing of any solid waste into or in any land.

Disposal site - refers to a site where solid waste is finally discharge and de-

posited. Domestic waste - is the refuse from households, as distinguished, as from industrial waste, agricultural waste, etc. which may be classified as biodegradable

(compostable) or non-biodegradable (non-compostable). Ecological waste management - refers to the systematic administration of ac-

tivities which provide for segregation at source, segragation at source transport, storage transfer, processing, treatment and disposal of solid waste and all other waste management activities, which do not harm the environment;

Environmental acceptable - refers to the quality of being reusable, biodegradable or compostable, recyclable and not toxic or hazardous to the environemnt.

Enzymes - a protein produced by cells, with the substances to initiate or accelerate chemical in plants or animal matter, acting like an organic catalysts.

Factory returnable - are non-biodegradable s, non-compostable such as tin ding br foam, rubber, dry paper, dry cardboard, dry cloth, fibers, leather, feathers, hard shells, hard bones, etc.; which are segregated in separate containers or placed in one sack (cans, bottles, containers already rinsed) and are sold or given away col-

Feed materials - are food wastes, peeling, veggie trims, fish entrails, fowl innards, spoiled fruits, leftover, egg shell, rice, fish, meat, washings, etc.; that should be collected and kept in covered containers as hog, chicken, ducks, pet or fish feeds;

Fermentable - refers to fruits peelings, spoiled or over ripe fruits, juice, e.g. buko juice, etc. are made into vinegar, wine or "nata de pina", etc.

Fertilizers materials - are compostable or biodegradable such as garden waste, (leaves, twigs, weeds), animal waste (manure, carcasses), human waste (feces, urine, blood) all excreta, soiled wipes, pads, diaper without the plastic portion, etc.; are made into compost for organic gardening.

Filling materials - refers to those that can be compacted, and mixed with rice chaff and "binders" for appropriate construction project;;

Fine crafts - are non-biodegradables which can be used as material for handicrafts, cottage industries, art work, toys and other livelihood projects such as paper mache, paper basketry, tin craft, plastic twines or rope braids, feather crafts, wooden crafts, Styrofoam melted in amount of gasoline solvent provides cheap glue or 'binder" for many of the project; **Food materials** - include certain kind of seeds, pulps, peeling, that is made

into pickles, "sweet: or candles, or snacks;

Functional facilities or equipment - are equipment of facilities devised or created from discards, throwaways, junks, scraps, e.g. chairs, table, doormats, play equipment from rubber tires, roofing milk cans, flower pots, "planters" from plastic bags, sacks, containers, etc.;

Generation - refers to the act of process of producing solid waste

Green charcoal - is another form of fuel or grass charcoal, manufacured from compostable, organic, cellulosic materials with the used of enzymes to breakdown the ligning or binding materials, after which it is molded and, or dried, then used

Hazardous waste - are special types of wastes containing chemical, biological, and radiological, elements which are harmful to human health;

Incineration - is the controlled process of which combustible waste are burned and changed into gases and residues that contain little or no combustible materials;

Landfill leachate - is the downward seeping of water through the landfill carry ing with it the dissolve water-soluble contents of the waste which may be collected by the underground drainage or water systems:

Material recovery facility (MRF) - include a solid waste transfer station or sortstation, drop-off center, a composting facility, and recycling facility;

Open dump - refers to the disposal wherein the solid wastes are indiscriminately thrown or disposed of without due planning and consideration of environmental and

Receptacles - refer to individual containers used for the source separation and collection of recyclable materials;

Recyclable materials - refers to any waste material retrieved from the waste stream and free from contamination that can still be converted into suitable beneficial use of for other purposes, including, but not limited to newspaper, ferrous scrap metal, non-ferrous scrap metal, used oil, corrugated cardboard, aluminum, glass, of fice paper, tin cans, and other materials as may be determined by the commission; Recycling - means the reuse, retrieval, re-commission of element matter for any

and all purposes necessary to healthful and productive living; the process by which waste materials or transformed into new products such the manner that the original products may lose the identity;

Recycling of domestic waste - refers to the full utilization of domestic waste into factory returnable (around 50-60%), feeds (about 20%), fertilizer (about 30%), fuels, fine crafts, fermentable, etc. with the little left or filling materials. (Proportion varies with the kind of community, the more affluent, and the more factory-returnable). This include both man devised and nature designed recycling.

Resource recovery - refers to the collection, extraction or recovery of recyclable material from the waste stream for the purpose of recycling, generating energy or producing a product suitable for beneficial use; provided, that such resource recovery facilities exclude incineration;

Reuse - refers to the process of recovering materials intended for the same or different purpose without the alternation of physical and chemical characteristics;

Sanitary landfill - refers to waste disposal site designed, constructed, operated and maintained in a manner that exerts engineering control over significant potential environmental impacts arising from the development and operation of the facility; Segregation at source - refers to the solid waste management practice of sepa-

rating, at the point of origin, different materials found in the solid waste in order to promote recycling and the re-use of resource and to reduce the volume of waste for the collection and disposal; Solid waste - include anything thrown away, such as garbage, rubbish, rash, lit-

ter, junk, and refuse from any source (homes, businesses, farms, industries, or institutions); discarded material with insufficient liquid contents to flow. Example are those non-liquid, wastes resulting domestic, commercial, agricultural and industrial activities which can be divided into several component, under three broad classifications 1. Compostable. Compostable waste shall be categorized into category A and

Food (Cooking) waste or kitchen waste: Peelings, leftovers, vegetable trims,

fish, fowl, meat and animal entrails, innards, cleanings, soft shells, seeds, etc

Animal wastes: manure, urine, carcasses, etc. Category B:

Agricultural (garden) waste: Leaves, flowers, twigs, branches, stems, roots, trimmings, weeds, seeds, inedible fruits, etc.

2. Reusable/recyclable:

Metals: tin cans, aluminum, iron, lead, copper, silver, etc.

* Glasses: polyethylene (bags), polypropylene (straws, jute sacks, container), polyurethane (foam, mattresses), polystyrenes (Styrofoam), polyvinyl (tubes, pipes, linoleum). Polyacetate (fibers, cloth, rayon), etc.

Papers: dry papers, cardboard, etc. Dry processed fibers: cloth, twine, etc.

3. Residual Waste:

Soiled pads, diapers, sanitary napkins, etc. Hard shells, bones, and rocks.

4. Special waste:

biodegradable and non-biodegradable.

* Paints, thinners, households batteries, lead-acid, spray canister, oil canister,

* Medical supplies and other hospital and industrial wastes. * Other hazardous wastes, including chemical, biological, and radioactive sub-

Solid waste management - is the purposeful and systematic, control or reduc-

tion of the generation, storage, collection, transport, separation, processing, recy cling, recovery and the final disposal of solid wastes: Sorting at source - or source separation is the segragation or separation of wastes at the point of generation or at the very place where they are produced, into

Source reduction - refers to the reduction of solid waste before it enters the sol id waste stream by methods such as product design, material substitution, material re-use and packaging restriction;

Special waste - refers to household hazardous waste such as paints, thinners, household batteries, lead-acid, spray canisters and the like. These include waste from residential and commecial sources that are usually that comprise of bulky wastes, consumer electronics, white goods, yard waste that are usually handled separately other residential and commercial waste;

Storage - Refers to the interim containment of the solid waste after generation and prior to collection for ultimate recovery or disposal;

Transfer station - refers to those facilities utilizes to receive solid waste, tempo rarily store, separate, convert, or otherwise process the material in the solid wastes, or to transfer the solid waste directly from smaller to larger vehicles for transport. This does not include any of the following:

a. A facility whose principal function is to receive, store, separate, convert or transfer or otherwise process manue in accordance with the national minimum stan-

b. The premises of a duly licensed solid waste handling operation that receives store, transfer or otherwise processes wastes as an activity incidental to the conduct of a refuse collection and disposal business.

 $\textbf{Waste diversion} \ - \ refers \ to \ the \ activity \ which \ reduces \ or \ eliminates \ the \ amount$ of solid waste sent to disposal facilities.

Zero waste resource management system - is an ecological method of handling waste that do not degrade the environment nor pollute air, water and oild, and fa-

Section 4. Declaration of Policies and Objectives. Consistent with the frame work of promoting sustainable environment as enshrined under Republic Act No. 9003, otherwise known as the Ecological Solid Waste Management Plan, the Municipal of Biri hereby adopts the following policies: (a) Maximum resource utilization, conversion and recovery:

as a possible form the very start, or should not occur or develop in the first place.

(b) Principal of participation and cooperation-emphasizes that environmental protection is matter for which not only the LGU is responsible and the latter cannot achieve environmental protection by merely imposing it as an obligation on industry and the society. The approach is based on maximum division of labor, cooperation and consensu.

(c) Polluter pay principal - Emphasizes that cost for environmental remediation and compensatory measures must be borne by the party or parties responsible for causing the damage.

Section 6. Objectives. The ordinance is enacted the following objectives: 1. To supplement the provision of the existing municipal ordinances relative to

- waste reduction, generation, transportation, treatment and disposal, in a manner that would promote an orderly and sanitary system for the same, and formulate systematic and comprehensive program that adopts best environmental methods and practices in solid waste management. 2. To reduce the volume of solid waste generated and increase possible resource
- recovery by: (a) maximizing the utility of goods and consumption of products that generate least volume and toxicity of trash; (b) allocating fair inputs in the production of goods, foods and services; (c) establishment of facilities for the recovery, recycling and/or re-use of resources feeds, fuel, materials, energy, etc.; and, (d) promoting indigenous and eco-friendly products and packaging materials to reduce dependence and generation of problematic materials like single-use plastic bags and containers.
- 3. To ensure a wholesome environment through conservation of valuable resources and the necessary control and mitigation of the impacts of unsanitary handling of solid waste by: (a) minimizing the pollution arising from harmful gases, smoke, particulates and heat produced by incineration and needles burning; (b) cessation of open garbage dump which serve as breeding places "greenhouse gases" and contribute global warming and thinning of ozone layer, generates "leachate" that pollutes soil and water resources, and promote unhealthy scavenging activities; and, (c) eradicating of unsightly, uncovered, unsegregated and overflowing waste contain ers in street, public places, and open spaces.

4. To promote and protect the public health, safety, peace and convenience and general welfare of the inhabitants of the municipality.

5. Institutionalize public participation, in the development and implementation of the municipality's integrated, comprehensive and ecological solid waste

management program. Section 7. Municipal Ecological Solid Waste Management Board. Pursuant to Executive Order No. Series of 2020, issued , 2020, the Municipal Ecological Solid Waste Board of Biri is hereby reconstituted as follows,

Section 8. Duties and Responsibilities. The board shall have the following duties and responsibilities: 1. Develop a municipal solid waste management plan that ensure a long-term

management of solid waste, as well as integrate the various solid waste management plans and strategies of the barangays in the area of jurisdiction. 2. Adopt measure to promote and ensure the viability and effective imple mentation of solid waste management program in its component barangay;

3. Monitor and evaluate the implementation of the municipal solid waste management plan through its various political subdivisions and in cooperation

with the private sector and NGO's; 4. Adopt specific revenue-generating measures to promote the viability of its solid waste management plan; 5. Convene regular and special meetings for the purpose of planning and coor-

dinating the implementation of the solid waste management plan of the respective

6. Oversee the implementation of solid waste management plan; 7. Review every (2) years or as the need arises the municipal solid waste management plan for the purposes of ensuring its sustainability, viability.

8. Effectiveness and relevance in relation to local and international development in the field of solid waste management;

9. Develop the specific mechanics and guidelines for the implementation of the MSWM plan; 10. Recommend to appropriate local government authorities specific measures of proposals for franchise or build operate transfer agreement with the duly

recognized institutions, pursuant to R.A. 6957, provide either exclusive or non-exclusive authority for collection, transfer, storage, processing, recycling, or disposal of municipal solid waste; 11. Recommend measures and safeguards against pollution and for the pres-

ervation of the natural ecosystem; 12. Coordinate the efforts of its components barangays in the implementation

of solid waste management plan; 13. Allow for the clustering of barangays for the solution of common waste

14. Provide the necessary logistical and operational support to its component barangay's in consonane with the subsection (f) of section 17 of the local government code of 1991.

Section 9. Municipal Solid Waste Management Technical Working Group - The board shall be assisted by the technical working group which shall be composed of the following:

The Technical Working Group (TWG) shall extend technical and administrative assistance which help the board in reaching substantive decisions, in the formulation of ecological solid waste management plans and programs and its dissemination to appropriate departments offices; facilitate the conduct of its regular and special meetings, including the preparation of communications and notice; and, extend other related assistance as may required by the board through its chairman.

Section 10. Municipal Environment and Natural Resources Office (MENRO). There shall be created a municipal environment and natural resources office (MEN RO) and hereby tasked to "provide sustainable, efficient solid waste management program. It shall directly oversee the operation and management of the municipal ity's ecological solid waste management services.

The MENRO shall be managed by a Municipal Environment and Natural Resources Officer whose powers and duties shall be as provided under section 484 of R.A. 7160 and as provided by the ordinane.

It shall be organized into (5) five sections or units, to wit:

- 1. Collection and Transport Section; 2. Administrative Recording Section;
- 3. MRF Operation and maintenance Unit; and;

4. Engineering Pump Site Maintenane Unit; and; 5. IEC/Research, Monitoring and Evaluation Unit.

Section 11. Municipal Ecology Center. There shall be established a municipal ecology center that shall provide consulting, information, training and networking services, as may be determined by the local Chief Executive, for the implementa tion of the provisions of this chapter.

It shall be perform the following function coordination with the concerned

1. Facilities training and education in integrated ecological solid waste magenement:

2. Establish and manage a solid waste management information database; 3. Establish marketing network for recyclables and reusable materials;

4. Provide or facilitate expert assistance in the operation of solid waste management facilities; 5. Conduct periodic monitoring and evaluation of the implementation of the

ecological solid waste management plan; and 6. Conduct research and development on solid waste minimization and re-

Section 12. Information and Educaiton Advocacy Core Group. These shall be organized an information and education advocacy core group under the municipal environment and natural resources office shall directly undertake all activities related to information dissemination and education of the services area, including the following:

(a) The conduct of intensive barangay-based information and education activities to ensure the residents and business establishments are made on the various components of the ecological solid waste management program such as, reduction of the generation of waste, and establishment of advocacy mechanism involving people's organization and other ordinance No. 2011-/01/-01/

on ecological solid waste management. (c) Establishment outdoor signboards, stickers, posted, and newsletters, flyers, brochures, leaflets distributed to raise people's awareness on the program. Section 13. Communication and Feedback Mechanism. The municipal Envi-

ronment and Natural Resources Office (MENRO) shall establish a communication center with the network and the hotlines for fast effective monitoring. It shall establish a continuing feedback mechanism with its services, clienteles,

especially on the aspect of waste collection. Section 14. Role of the Barangays and the Municipal Government in Solid

Waste Management. Pursuant to the provisions of the Local Government Code of 1991, the LGU's shall be primarily responsible of this chapter within their re-

spective jurisdictions. a) The Barangay. Each barangay, through the barangay ecological solid waste management committee, shall closely monitor, supervise, and intervene in the reduction, segragation, storage, collection disposal of solid waste at their level, and submit monthly report to the municipal ecological waste management board, through the MENRO. A Pre-forma report from thereof shall be readily prepared by the office, it shall facilitate and support the establishment of material recovery facilities-cum-buy back centers and composting facilities in every barangay cluster

b) The municipal government. The Municipal government shall, among others, be responsible for the residual and special wastes, including that transport thereof of the controlled dumpsite/sanitary landfill or TDS (treatment, storage, and disposal) facilities duly authorized by the EMD-DENR. The municipal government shall also extent logistic, technical and operational assistance to the barangays in the management of ecological solid waste management. For this purpose, the Liga ng mga Barangay shall, within forty-five (45) days from affectively of the ordinance. Conduct assessment to determine those barangays that need said as-

Section 15. Budget Appropriate for Ecological Solid Waste Management Program. (a) there shall be regularly appropriated in the annual fund of budget of the municipality an item for the ecological solid waste management program, the amount thereof shall be sufficient to cover the cost of the implementation of the program's various component, considering all other sources of funds for

Section 16. Trust Fund for Ecological Solid Waste Management. (a) There shall be established a trust fund to be known as the ecological solid waste management fund to which accrue funds coming from the municipal government, national government, and the local and foreign sources, such as Page garbage, service charges/fees and fine arising from the enforcement of this Ordinance including but not limited to:

- 1. Acquisition of products, facilities, technologies, and processes to enhance proper management and disposal of waste;
 - 2. Giving of awards and incentives;
 - 3. Conduct of research, education and information dissemination; and
 - 4. Communication and monitoring activities.

Section 17. Barangay Ecological Solid Waste Management Committee. There shall be created in every barangay a barangay solid waste management committee composed of the following:

The Barangay Ecological Solid Waste Management Committee shall have the following functions and responsibilities: ${\bf 1.}\, Adopt \, or \, formulate \, ecologica \, waste \, management \, program \, consistent \, with \,$

- that of the municipality; 2. Facilities and monitor the implementation of the provisions of this ordi-
- nance at their level: 3. Establish or facilities the establishment of material recovery facility cum-
- Buy-Back center that has composting facility in their jurisdiction;
- 4. Allocate funds for ecological solid waste management program and look for source thereof;
- 5. Organize and train the ecological waste management teams who will conduct the actual monitoring, coordination, and enforcement of the ecological waste management ordinance.
- 6. Submit regular status report on the implementation of this ordinance to the municipal ecological solid waste management board through MENRO.

A. Waste Reduction at Source

Section 18. Waste Reduction at Source. Households, institutional, industrial, commercial and agricultural establishments and all other sectors shall, as a matter of priority, avoid, prevent and minimize waste to reduce the generation thereof at source and minimize the cost of operation of the solid waste management system

Section 19. Avoidance and Prevention of Waste. Pursuant to provisions of R.A. 9003, the manufacture, purchase, distribution or use of materials that create excessive amount or toxicity of trash shall be prohibited.

Section 20. Minimization of Waste. The municipality shall, upon recommendation by the municipal ecology center and upon approval by the solid waste management board, identity and the recommend the use of materials and products that can be reused with processing, and encourage adherence to activiies or lifestyles that generate less waste.

Section 21. Disposal through Environment Solid Waste Management. Where generation of waste cannot be avoided, they must be recovered in an environmentally sound waste management facility in accordance with ecologically sustainable development principles

Section 22. In- House Waste Reduction Plan. A mandatory In- House Waste Reduction Plan shall be required for every commercial and industrial establishment prior to issuance or renewal of business permit.

Section 23. Organization of Small - Scale Industries for Using of Indigenous Materials. The municipal government shall promote and extend assistance, financial and otherwise, in the organization of small-scale industries that shall design, promote and proliferate the use of indigenous materials.

Section 24. Provision for Incentive Program. An incentives program shall be formulated by the municipal environment and natural resources office (MENRO) in coordination with the technical working group and approved by the board that will provide recognition and award for individuals, households, commercial and industrial establishments, private organizations, barangays and other entities which made or undertaken innovations or manifested notable compliance with the provisions of R.A.9003 and this Ordinance.

Waste Segregation and Storage

Section 25. Waste Segregation at Source. (a) Pursuant to the "No Segregation, No Collection" policy of the Municipality of Biri (as directed in the Letter/ Instruction of the Municipal Mayor to the 8 barangays dated July 19, 2010, memorandum to the department heads dated July 28, 2010, and memoranda to garbage truck drivers and collectors, business operators and barangay chairmen dated September 3, 2010, individuals, households, commercial, institutional and agricultural establishments as well as transport facilities, shall be required to individually sort or classify their wastes in accordance with the prescribed classifications. Wastes shall not segregated shall not be collected.

- (b) The following shall be the minimum requirements for segregation and storage of solid waste pending collection:
- 1. There shall be separated container/plastic bags for each type of waste from all sources. For bulky waste, it will suffice that the same be collected and placed in separate container/plastic bags designated by in the areas;
- 2. The solid waste container depending on its use shall be properly marked or identified for on-site collection of compostable, recyclable or special wastes or any other classification as may be determined by the MSWMB.
- 3. For premises containing six (6) or more residential units, such as residential compounds, boarding houses, apartels, dormitories and such other establishments, the MSWMB shall promulgate rules and regulations requiring the owner or person in charge of such premises to:
- (a) provide for the residents a designated area and containers in which to accumulate source separated recyclable materials to be collected by the MRF operator, the barangay, or the municipal government; and
- (b) Notify all workers, employees, and entitles working in the premises of the requirements of this ordinance and the regulations promulgated pursuant

Section 26. Classification of Collection Waste. The segregation of collectable wastes shall be as they are hereunder classified:

- 1. Compostable. Compostable wastes shall be categorized in to category A and B.
- Category A
- Food (cooking) wastes or kitchen wastes: Peelings, leftovers, vegetables, trims, fish, fowl, meat and the animal entrails, innards, cleaning, crofts, shells, seeds, etc.
- Animal wastes: manure, urine, carcasses, etc.
- Category B:
- Agricultural (garden) wastes: Leaves, flowers, twigs, branches, stems, roots, trimmings, weeds, seeds, in-

- 2. Reusable/recyclable
- Metals: tin cans, aluminum, iron, lead, copper, silver, etc. • Glasses: bottles, cullet, (broken glass), Sheets (shards), minor, bulbs, etc.
- Plastics: Polyethylene (bags), polypropylene (straws, jute sacks, container), Polyurethane (foam, mattresses), polystyrene(Styrofoam),polyvinyl (tubes, pipes, linoleum). Polyacetate (fibers, cloth, rayon), etc.

- Rubber (natural and synthetic): tires, goods, etc.
- Dry processed fibers: Cloth, twine, etc.
- 3. Residual Waste.
- Solid pads, diapers, sanitary napkins, etc.
- Hard shells: Bones and rocks.
- 4. Special Wastes
- Paints, thinners, households batteries, lead- acid batteries, spray canisters, oil canister, tires.
 - Medical supplies and other hospital and industrialist wastes. · Other hazardous wastes, including chemicals, biological and radioactive sub
- Section 27. Waste Storage Container. Households and business establishments shall have storage containers provided for every waste classification/category mentioned above. The municipality of Biri shall, upon recommendation by the board,

either require households and business establishments to buy the said containers form designated source or individually made or secured. Section 28. Waste Segregation and Storage. The storage waste in residential,

commercial, industrial, and institutional establishments, transport facilities, public places and agricultural areas shall be as follows;

(a) Waste storage in residential areas:

- 1. Residents all ensure that the generated solid wastes shall be properly separated in (3) enclosed containers for recoverable, leftovers, compostable and others. The leftovers or kitchen refuse shall either be directly given to animals as feeds or stored temporarily for composing or biogas production;
- 2. Residents shall choose proper containers such as cans, sacks, bags, bin, etc that will facilitate sanitary efficient handling, storage, collection, transport or disposal at least cost. Food waste shall be placed in covered cans and pails. Garden waste in sacks, can, bags or boxes; 3. Public thoroughfares and grounds in front or in vicinity of residential houses
- shall be kept clean and tidy by the owners or lessees of the houses or building at all 4. Trees, shrubs and other vegetation in front or in vicinity of residences shall be
- regularly cared for and maintained to minimize generated wastes, yard wastes and
- (b) Waste storage in commercial Areas, including markets or agoras, shall be done as follow:
- 1. Segregation of waste from commercial areas (shopping malls, restaurants, commercial complexes, recreational centers, etc.) shall be mandatory;
- 2. Markets or agoras shall adopt a segregation scheme that will facilitate the segregation of recyclables, foods or vegetable waste, non-recyclables, etc.; 3. Storage containers for segregation commercial waste shall be communal or
- individual with cover; 4. The enclosed communal receptacle preferably on wheel shall be located along
- the collection route where the generated waste shall be brought and stored by the stall lessees; 5. The lobby and fronting sidewalks or immediate grounds of commercial establishments shall be maintained clean and presentable by the owners, operators,
- or lessees of the establishments, e.g., shops, stall, stores, restaurants, eateries, car enderias, barbershops, beauty parlors, recreational and entertainments facilities like theaters. billiard halls, folk halls, folk houses, beer gardens, discos, cocktail, lounges, dancing halls, cabarets, bistros, etc.; 6. The fronting sidewalks immediate areas of stalls and open spaces of markets
- shall be kept clean and orderly by the lessees of said stalls or spaces at all times. (c) Waste storage in institutional or industrial areas shall likewise be done, as
- follows: 1. Segregation of biodegradable or compostable and biodegradable or non-com-
- postable wastes shall be performed to avoid foul odors and proliferation of files; 2. The head of any institutional or industrial firm shall ensure the proper hygien
- ic storage of generated in segregation of waste in receptacles or containers which shall be situated along collection routes; 3. Hazardous waste shall be stored safely in good, durable duly covered recep
- tacles or containers which shall be located in a secure and distant site, prior to final collection and disposal; 4. The head of any institutional or industrial firm or establishment shall ensure the cleanliness and orderliness of its facilities, yards, and its fronting sidewalks and

(d) Waste storage in transport facilities shall be done as follows;

- 1. The managers, operators or drivers of transport terminals, buses, jeepneys, megataxis, tricycle and pedicabs shall provide separated receptacles for biodegradable and non-biodegradable wastes;
- 2. The receptacles shall be with cover and so located inside the facility do that it accessible to all passengers; and,
- 3. For buses, jeepneys, megataxis, tricycles, pedicabs contents of waste recep tacle shall be emptied and sorted a transfer station located along collection routes.
- (e) Waste storage in parks, public open spaces and thoroughfares shall be done 1. Theft-proof receptacle for biodegradable and non-biodegradable waste shall
- be provided in strategic locations in parks, public open spaces, and along thoroughfares by the Municipal Government 2. Section 29 hereof, for its anti-littering provisions, shall be strictly observed and
- (f) Homogenous agricultural wastes, i.e., rice straw, corn cabs, ribs, animal manure, etc. shall be properly stockpiled or stored.

Section 29. Littering and scavenging. No person shall litter, scatter or scavenge solid waste in the streets, highways, sidewalks, vacant lots and other areas, e.g., parks, playgrounds, rivers, etc. solid waste shall include, among others, cigar or cig arettes butts, boxes, package, candy and bread wrappers, match sticks, disposable diapers food packages, etc

enforced; and,

Section 30. Solid waste collection. To efficiently undertaken the collection of solid wastes, the Municipal Government shall, as recommend in its ten-years Ecological Solid Waste Management Plan, provide for the following:

- (a) Purchase additional collection equipments;
- (b) Provide appropriate training for collection crew on the proper procedure of waste collection; and,
- (c) Come up with programs, through the Municipal Environment and Natural Resources Office, that would install a high sense of cooperation among constituents, that is, employ personnel and give them equitable salaries those for the drivers, garbage collectors, auto mechanic;
- Section 31. Method of Collection. In the collection of solid wastes, the Municipality shall adopt or prescribe a combination of block and curb side collection Section 32. Schedule of Waste Collection. (a) there shall be a regular schedule
- for the collection waste for every classification or category, and no person shall bring such waste outside his/her household or establishments except on the day designated for the collection. (b) Storage containers or bags shall be brought out in front of the gates of the
- residential houses and business establishments thirty (30) minutes before the collection schedule. (d) Households outside the Poblacion shall deposit their wastes along the main
- streets accessible to municipal garbage trucks in thirty (30) minutes before the collection schedule. For those unable to avail of the garbage collection services, they shall dispose of property and (e) efficiently their wastes through individual backyard burying or handling.
 - (f) No scavenging or unauthorized collection in designated containers or areas
- shall be allowed. Section 33. Municipal Collection Plan. A Municipal Collection Plan shall be for-
- mulated and posted in strategic in conspicuous areas by the Municipal Environment and Natural Resources Office specifying therein the collection routes, schedules and responsibilities, taking into consideration the collection capacity of the Material Recovery Facilities Cum Buy- Back Center and Composting Center operating in the Section 34. Collection and Transportation. The collection and transportation
- of waste shall be as follows: (a) For residential areas:
 - 1. Residents shall ensure the recyclable, compostable (except households that
- practice backyard composting) and residual waste brought out in front of their gate or door and along the collection routes of the collection vehicles or cart, during the collection period. 2. The concerned residents shall report to the Municipal Environment and Natu-
- ral Resources Office any uncollected solid waste within the vicinity of the residences;
- 3. Garbage not segregated and placed in approve containers shall not be collected and shall be treated as disposed of in violation of section 29 hereof, or anti-litter

ing provision, and the person liable shall be penalized accordingly;

(b) For commercial areas:

- 1. The owner, operator or lessor any enterprise shall be responsible for the timely positioning of stored solid waste during the schedule of collection. Likewise, he/she shall assist, whenever necessary, in the sanitary means of loading waste for collection purposes; and,
- 2. The person concerned shall inform the Municipal Environment and Natural Resources Office of any uncollected solid waste and related matters.

(c) For institutional or industrial areas:

- 1. The head of any institutional or industrial establishment shall assist in the orderly and sanitary way of collecting and transporting solid waste;
- 2. The collection and transportation of industrial solid waste, if necessary, shall be duly coordinated with the government agencies concerned with such type
- 3. School, both public and private, shall adopt appropriate resource recovery and recycling strategies.
- 4. Hazardous wastes shall be collected and transported in accordance with applicable laws, guidelines, rules and regulations of the Environmental Manage ment Bureau (EMB-DENR), Department of Health (DOH), and the Philippines Nuclear Research Institute (PENRI).

(d) Solid wastes from transport terminals, transfer stations, parks, public open species and thoroughfares shall be brought on the Material Recovery Facility and Composting Center of the Barangay that has jurisdiction over the area by MRF's collection crew, or the Municipal Government in case of the former's incapacity.

d. Waste treatment by composting

Section 35. Waste treatment by composting. Organic materials, such as leaves, grass, food, scraps, and other similar wastes shall be treated using the method of decomposition by organism or controlled composting.

Section 36. Composting Facility. For the treatment and disposal of com postable wastes, there shall be establish one (1) operational composting facility per barangay's, and one (1) composting facility for the Biri Public Market.

Section 37. Management and Collection of compostable waste. (a) a composting facility shall, as much as possible, be a component under an existing Material Recovery Faculty Cum Buy-Back Center. Where it is not practicable, it shall be managed and operated by the barangay or cluster of barangay and / or by a duly organized people's organization (PO) who shall undergo a comprehensive organization and management training prior to operation. The collection and composting of compostable wastes shall be undertaken by the organization in their respective barangay or barangay's of operation using their own collection equipment's and composting facility.

(b) The compost products intended to be commercially shall confirm with the standards for organic fertilizers prescribed by the Department of Agriculture.

(c) No person shall commence operation, including site preparation and construction of a new solid waste management facility or the expansion of an existing facility until said person obtains an Environment Compliance Certificate (ECC) from the DENR pursuant to P.D. 1586 and other permits and clearance from concerned Section 38. Market Linkages and Buy-Back Centers or Composts. The man-

agement and operators of composting facilities and the LGU through the Municipal Ecology Center shall establish market linkage and buy-back Center for Composts. Section 39. Composting for Residential and Household Wastes. (a) com-

posting of food and kitchen refuse and garden wastes, shall be required for residential units and individual households that have backyard areas sufficient for composting. (b) Residents may also practice the F's scheme (feed, fermentable, food, and

using food and kitchen refuse as fodder or feeds for animals and composting those portions that are not suitable as fodder. Fuel materials may also be made out of the following household wastes;

(a) A materials recovery facility-cum-buy back center shall be established in every barangay or cluster of barangays by LGU in partner ship with business operators. The center may be established in a barangay-owned or leased land or any suitable open space to be determined by the barangay

- through its Sangguniar (b) The center shall have the following components:

periodic monitoring and evaluation of operation of the controlled dumpsite/sanitary landfill Section 47. Disposal of Solid Waste. (a) Disposal of solid wastes in residen-

tial, commercial and institutional areas shall be done as follows: 1. Incineration and open burning of solid wastes shall be prohibited. Residuals of solid wastes after recovery, recycling and composting shall be disposed of by sanitary landfilling or other ecological sound methods;

A. Manufacturer, Producer and Processors: With an aggregate area of: 1000 sq.m. or more

2. Hospital wastes, especially infections wastes, shall be disposed of in accordance with the provision of DOH administrative Order No.29 s. 2003, In relation to Section 20 of Republic Act 8749, also known as the Clean Air Act and it's Implementing Rules and Regulation (IRR) and other applicable laws and issuances. 3. Any public office who will willfully or grossly neglects the performance of an ordinance specifically enjoined as a duty by this ordinance or its implementing rules and regulations; or abuse of authority in the performance of this duty or in any manner, improperly performs his duties under this ordinance or its implementing rules and regulations. Provided, however, that no suit shall be file until after lapse of the period prescribed by law for the issuance of a notice to the public officer and alleged violator and no appropriate action has been taken thereon;

Section 53. Implementing Rules. The Office of the Mayor through the Ecological Solid Waste Management Board should formulate its implementing rules and regulations; Section 54. Applicability Clause. Provisions of such other laws regulations as

they pertain to the subject matter in this ordinance, applicable in the municipality are made integral part hereof; Section 55. Repealing Clause. Ordinance No. 04, s of 2000 of the municipality

of Biri, Northern Samar is hereby amended. All other ordinances, executive orders or regulations which are inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed, amended or Section 56. Separability Clause. If any provisions of this Ordinance or its ap-



not just know him and not love him, nor should we just love him without knowing him—or at least, trying to know him the best way that we can, since being God, Christ has aspects that are a mystery to us, that is, beyond our capacity to know him

It's when we love him with all our heart as we are commanded to do (cfr. Mt 22,37) that whatever inadequacy we have with respect to our knowledge of him, is taken care of. If our heart is united we the heart of God, that is, when we are in love with God, we in a mysterious way share in the omniscience of God.

That is why we can say that those simple people with great love and piety for God has greater knowledge of God than those erudite theologians and philosophers whose love and piety for God

is not as great as those of the simple people, in spite of the fact that they may have studied the faith a lot more.

This does not mean that loving God with the heart more than the head is a matter of indulging in emotionalism and things like that. If one truly loves God with his whole heart, he also will do everything in his human capacity to study his faith well and to conform his life to that faith.

Loving God never compromises our rational nature that has both the intuitive and discursive capabilities. Loving God uses these capabilities to the hilt but also acknowledges the limitations of these human powers. Loving God, more than anything else, involves the role of grace that God himself unstintingly gives us but to which we have to correspond properly with our acts of piety.

Out of the 1,000 units put up by LGUs

DOH says only more than 200 COVID-19 facilities pass their standards

TACLOBAN Out of the 1,000 temporary treatment monitoring facility intended for returning individuals and suspects of COVID-19, only over 200 of them have been certified by the Department of Health (DOH).

This was disclosed by Dr. Exuperia Sabalberino, the assistant regional director of the DOH, who said that many of these facilities are not within the required standard set by their office.

"Under DOH standard, we have requirements and we impose this for the isolation facility," she said.

Standard DOH isolation facility needs to have a handwashing area, own comfort room in every unit and must use division materials that can prevent virus from spreading to other patients or to quarantine and isolation personnel.

Sabalberino also disclosed that some isolation facilities uses cloth as division for every unit which is not acceptable because virus can pass through to other areas.

"This standard is imposed for the safety of patients and the health personnel," she stressed.

DOH certified isolation facility may be accredited by the Philippine Health

Insurance Corp. (Phil-Health) wherein they can receive P22,449 per quarantined person for the services they rendered.

Isolation facilities that did not meet the required standard can still be used by the local government units but only for quarantine purposes.

Sabalberino said that Eastern Visayas has the most number of Phil-Health accredited TTMF.

'This means that we can accommodate more locally stranded individuals (LSIs). This also helps us in controlling the transmission of the virus," she explained.

Be it ordained by the Sangguniang Bayan of San Jose, Northern Samar in session assembled that:

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE USE OF PLASTIC CELLOPHANE AND SANDO BAGS AS PACKAGING MATERIALS AND UTILIZATION OF POLYSTYRENE COMMONLY KNOWN AS STYROFOAM FOR FOOD AND BEVERAGES CONTAINERS IN THE MUNICIPALITY OF SAN JOSE, NORTHERN SAMAR AND PRESCRIBING PENALTIES THEREOF

WHEREAS, Section 16, Article II of the 1987 Philippine Constitution provides that: the State shall advance the right of the people to a balanced and healthful ecology in accord with the rhythm and harmony of

WHEREAS, Section 3 (i) of R.A. 7160 provides that Local Government Units shall share with the national government the responsibility in the management and maintenance of ecological balance within their territorial jurisdiction;

WHEREAS, Section 447 (1)(vi) of R.A. 7160 empowers the Sangguniang Bayan to protect the environment and impose appropriate penalties for acts within endanger the environment which results in pollution, acceleration or eutrophication of rivers and lakes or of ecological imbal-

WHEREAS, plastic cellophane and sando bags and expandable polystyrene (EPS) foams being non-biodegradable materials clog our canals, creeks, rivers and other water ways causing floods during rainy season and causing harm to these waterways and the surrounding communities;

WHEREAS, plastic cellophane and sando bags and expandable polystyrene (EPS) foams are widely used for packaging of foods and beverages. However, the use of plastics and polystyrene are rampantly used as packaging materials in the Municipality of San Jose, Northern Samar and elsewhere:

WHEREAS, despite serious efforts of the Municipality in implementing Republic Act No. 9003 otherwise known as the Ecological Solid Waste Management Act of 2000 to segregate biodegradable, recyclable and reusable waste materials, plastics, polystyrene and other similar materials remain in the municipal waste stream and eventually remain as the common residual waste fraction:

WHEREAS, the Municipality of San Jose, Northern Samar in its desire to regulate the "single use" of plastic cellophane and sando bags and eventual prohibition of the use, sale and provision of plystyrene as food and beverages containers, encourages the utilization of alternative packaging materials such as woven bags (bayong), cloth/paper bags and other similar organic packaging materials (e.g. banana leaves, taro leaves, etc.) and likewise advocates the "No Plastic Day" and "Bring Your Own Bag (BYOB)" programs of the Municipal Government;

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the health, safety and welfare of hte people of San Jose, Northern Samar to minimize the use of plastic cellophane and sando bags and the eventual prohibition of the use, sale and provision of polystyrene as packaging materials for food and

NOW. THEREFORE, after thorough deliberations and discussions and upon motion of HON. HARLAN A. TOMENIO, SR. with secondment of HON. ELECTORADO P. SOMORAY, JR. and HON. MA. GUNDELINA V. BAL-ASOLLA, this Sangguniang Bayan in session assembled hereby ordains

SECTION 1. Title - This Ordinance shall be known and cited as an "An Ordinance Regulating the Use of Plastic Cellophane and Sando Bags as Packaging Materials and Utilization of Polystyrene commonly known as Styrofoam for Food and Beverages Containers in the Municipality of San Jose, Northern Samar".

SECTION 2. Definition of Terms - For purposes of this Ordinance, the following terms are defined as follows:

a.) Alternative packaging materials - refer to recyclable, reusable and/or biodegradable packaging materials that are used in containing, carrying, holding and/or transporting goods or products, as an alternative to plastic bag

- b.) Bring Your Own Bag (BYOB) Program refers to the program adopted by business establishments, whereby customers are enjoined to bring a reusable bag, paper bag, cloth bag or any other alternative packaging material for purposes of containing, carrying, holding and transporting goods
- c.) Cloth bag refers to reusable packaging material made of cloth used in the packaging of flour, wheat and other similar goods.
- d.) Container refers to a type of material utilized for purposes of holding, enclosing, packaging and/or restraining edible food and beverages for
- e.) Expanded polystyrene (EPS) foam is thermoplastic petrochemical material which utilizes a styrene monomer and is processed by fusion of polymer spheres. It is a type of polystyrene product commonly used as containers for food and beverages.
- f.) Packaging shall refer to the packaging, packing and wrapping of products for purpose of carrying the same in a convenient manner.
- g.) Plastic bag refers to a type of bag made of thin, flexible, plastics film that is designed to be provided or utilized at the point of sale for containing, carrying, holding and transporting goods.
- h.) Plastic wastes refer to any plastic packaging material thrown as
- i.) Plastic cellophane is transparent, thin film plastic sheet made of regenerated cellulose having low permeability to air, oil, greases, bacteria and water makes it useful for food packaging.
- j.) Reusable bag refers to a washable canvass bag or native bag "bayong" or any shopping bag used for carrying and transporting goods, which bags are made of organic or non-organic materials that can be used for
- k.) Sando bags refer to a type of plastic packaging with handles for the purpose of carrying, holding and/or transporting goods and other produce. This term shall likewise be defined as one similar to the term plastic bag.
 - L) Single-use disposable or used for only one time.
- m.) Styrofoam is a trademark of a product made up of light resilient foam of polystyrene. For purposes of this Ordinance the term "Styrofoam" shall refer to the Expanded Polystyrene (EPS) Foam used as containers for food and beverages.
- n.) Woven bags refers to biodegradable packaging material made of woven native materials e.g. pandan or buri leaves and other similar mate-

SECTION 3. Regulation on the Use, Sale or Provision of Plastic Bags -The following regulations shall be imposed as follows:

- a.) Business establishments, fast-food outlets, market vendors, food kiosks, sari-sari stores, ambulant vendors, and the like are prohibited from using plastic cellophanes and sando bags as packaging materials for cus-
- b.) Stores and other retail establishments are mandated to use any alternative legally compliant packaging material for customers, such as but not limited to the materials mentioned in Section 4 hereof, in lieu of single-use plastic cellophanes and sando bags.

SECTION 4. Alternative Packaging Materials - The use of recyclable, reusable and/or biodegradable alternative packaging materials should be encouraged and promoted, such as reusable woven bags (bayong), cloth bags, rattan baskets, shopping bags made from recycled waste paper and other bags made out of biodegradable materials (e.g. banana leaves, taro leaves, water lily, corn stalk, etc.) shall be utilized as alternative packaging materials. All business establishments are encouraged to adopt the "Bring Your Own Bag" Program.

SECTION 5. Incentives for Using Reusable Bags - To promote the use of reusable bags, stores are hereby encouraged to implement the BYOB Program and to formulate appropriate incentives to consumers, which may

Green Lane - Stores/stalls may provide special counters or express lanes to be called as Green Lane to cater customers who bring their own bags or use of reusable bags.

SECTION 6. Prohibition on the Use, Sale of Provision of Styrofoam - Business establishments, restaurants, fastfood outlets, food kiosks, catering services and the like shall not utilize, sell or provide styrofoams or expanded polystyrene foam as containers for food and beverages.

SECTION 7. Alternative Containers for Food and Beverage - The use of reusable and/or paper-based containers for food and/or beverage and other alternative containers are encouraged and promoted.

SECTION 8. Technical Working Group - For the purpose of this Ordinance, a Technical Working Group shall be established with the following

SECTION 9. Functions of Technical Working Group - The Technical Working Group shall have the following functions:

- a.) The formulation of the Implementing Rules and Regulations as well as the Guidelines in the proper implementation of this Ordinance;
- b.) Identify the activities and programs to be conducted during the
- c.) Identify the environmental advocacies, programs and projects to be funded by the Local Government;
- d.) Recommend measures for the proper implementation of this Or-

SECTION 10. Monitoring of Ordinance - The Municipal Environment and Natural Resources Office (MENRO) in coordination with San Jose Municipal Police Station shall monitor the effective implementation of this Ordinance and shall likewise prepare a periodic report on the progress of the implementation of this Ordinance and shall furnish the Sangguniang Bayan a copy of the same.

RDINANCE

SECTION 11. Information, Education and Communication Campaign - Upon approval of this Ordinance, the Municipality through the Municipal Environment and Natural Resources Office (MENRO) in coordination with the Technical Working Group, shall conduct massive information, education and communication campaigns and shall include the promotion of alternative biodegradable packaging materials. The information and education campaign shall include the production and distribution of materials related and consistent with the provisions of this Ordinance.

SECTION 12. Implementing Rules and Regulations - Within thirty (30) days from the approval of this Ordinance, the necessary rules and regulations shall be issued by the Technical Working Group for the proper and effective implementation of this Ordinance.

SECTION 13. Penalty - The penalty for violation of this Ordinance shall be as follows:

For Business Establishments:

Third offense

First offense Fine of PhP 500.00 Second offense Fine of PhP 1,000.00

Third offense Fine of PhP 2,500.00 and permanent cancellation of license to operate

Fine of PhP1,000.00

For Individuals:

Fine of PhP 300.00 First offense Second offense Fine of PhP 500.00

SECTION 14. Moratorium and Implementation - All business establishments, sari-sari stores, ambulant vendors, market vendors, food kiosks and the like engaged in the use and/or selling of plastic bags and styrofoam as packaging materials for food and beverages shall be given six (6) months from the date of effectivity of this Ordinance to dispose of their remaining inventory and for consumers to adjust and conform.

SECTION 15. Separability Clause - If, for any reason or reasons, any part or provisions of this Ordinance shall be held to be unconstitutional or invalid, other part or provisions hereof which are not affected thereby shall continue to be in full force and effect.

SECTION 16. Repealing Clause - Ordinances, rules and/or regulations or parts thereof, which are inconsistent or in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed and/or modified accordingly.

SECTION 17. Effectivity Clause - This Ordinance shall take effect after posting in a public and conspicuous place in all sixteen (16) barangays of San Jose, Northern Samar.

Bella Rentuaya told reporters that personnel from Police Provincial Office, based in Naval town together with the operatives from Naval and Libagon Municipal Police Stations, Southern Leyte MASPSTA and Regional Intelligence Unit 8 successfully arrested Luzviminda Orillo on August 12, 2020 in Sitio Bigaa, San Pablo, Naval.

Rentuaya said that Orillo a.k.a. Remy, 54 years old is a resident of Sitio Bigaa, Barangay San Pablo, Naval.

She was said to be a member of the rebel group operating in Leyte and Southern Leyte provinces who was involved in NPA Operation Code Name "Operation Venereal Disease" that massacred around 67 people sometime in the year 1985 and buried in a mass grave

at Mt Sapang Dako, Brgy. Kaulisihan, Inopacan, Leyte that was discovered on August 26, 2006 by the Philippine Army.

Rentuaya said that according to the initial report, the arrest was organized after a case build-up on the whereabouts of the above cited wanted person. Thus, on the said time and date joint operatives immediately plotted an operation.

Rentuaya said that Orillo was arrested by virtue of warrant of arrest for 15 counts for murder issued byJudge. Thelma Bunyi-Medina, presiding judge of National Capital Judicial Region, RTC, Branch 32, Manila.

She added that the Orillo was brought to Naval Police Station for documentation and proper disposition. "Our Police Force is in all-out campaign against terrorism and campaign to End Local Communist Armed Conflict despite this pandemic and we will make sure to bring them before the court of law," Rentuaya

caretakers.

They came from the towns of Lawaan, Eastern Samar; Villareal in Samar province; and Tanauan in Leyte province.

All patients are now confined at the Eastern Visayas Regional Medical Center (EVRMC), this city.

John Paul Roca, information officer of the DOH, said that considering that these new patients were exposed to the virus while attending their loved ones at the EVRMC, there is no way that they could spread

"It's not alarming because they never went out of the hospital. They have high risk of exposure since they were direct contacts of the confirmed cases. They were there because their patients need assistance," he said.

The patients, Roca said, have pre-existing medical conditions reason why they need to have somebody close to them while they were in confinement.

Also infected were a doctor from Palo town, Leyte and a nurse in Catarman, Northern Samar. Both got the infection from COVID-19 patients.

In Catarman, its rural health unit was shut down on Friday for disinfection.

week, COVID-19 cases of the region rose by more than 130. As of Friday, the region has now total cases of 1,464.

And obviously alarmed on the rising COVID-19 cases of the region, the DOH has called on the public and different government agencies to closely cooperate to help slowdown the progress of the dreaded virus in the region.

Dr. Exuperia Sabalberino, the assistant regional director of the DOH, said that there are now several areas in the region which have 'local cases' which means the affected individuals were infected of the virus from an individual within their areas or villages.

Among these areas is in Basey, Samar, particularly in Barangay Villa Aurora where it has now 41 cases of which eight were children.

The town has a total 70 COVID-19 cases.

Aside from Basey, the DOH has also identified the following areas in Eastern Visayas which have local cases of COVID-19: Palo, Carigara, Tanauan, Barugo, Matag-ob, and the cities of Ormoc and Tacloban, all in Levte: Almeria in Biliran: and Lawaan and Giporlos, both in Eastern Samar.

"We are calling for the cooperation of the different government agencies and the public. During this time of pandemic, we all need to act as one. We need whole-of-government, whole-of-system approach," Sabalberino said.
