Alfred asks Mr. Chinatown to use title to inform the youth to follow protocols amid COVID-19 pandemic

TACLOBAN CITY- A one-year old boy from Catarman, Northern Samar is among the latest and the youngest to have died due to complications of the coronavirus disease (COVID-19) in Eastern Visayas.

The boy, who was also said to be suffering from a tumor, died on Oct. 22 just hours after he was swabbed while being confined at the Eastern Visayas Regional Medical Center (EVRMC) here in the city, the information office of the Catarman municipal government said.

He was buried the following day (Oct. 23) in a public cemetery in Catarman town. He was said to be a close contact of his father and grandfather, both confirmed to have the infection.

He was the second from Catarman to have died due to COVID-19, the first being a 76-year old man who died last Oct.12.

Catarman, with its rising COVID-19 cases, is now under modified enhanced community quarantine for 15 days which started last District Hospital in Allen Oct. 20.

Also from Northern Samar, a 76-year old man was also reported to have died due to COVID-19 complications.

The elderly from Laoang town was suffering from diabetes, pneumonia and urinary tract infection, died on

Oct.24 while confined at the Northern Samar Provincial Hospital.

Northern Samar has now four COVID-19 related deaths, pulling the region's total deaths due to the dreaded infection to 59.

Meantime, the Allen town, Northern Samar, was closed for 10 days effective Oct. 23 for disinfection after an employee was tested positive of COVID-19.

Tacloban council to approve measure institutionalizing policies during pandemic situation

TACLOBAN CITY An ordinance which will institutionalize policies and measures once there is an emerging and reemerging disease is set to be approved by the Sangguniang Panlungsod members of this city. The proposed ordinance, "Adopting the protective and precautionary measures against infectious diseases during a state of epidemic or public health emergency," aims to institutionalize all the health protocols that are set by the government to prevent spread of virus or diseases in times of pandemic.

Operations of Allen terminals resume after a day of suspension due 'Quinta'

TACLOBAN CITY-The operation of the three sea terminals in Allen town, Northern Samar resumed at around 5 am Monday(Oct.26)after the no sailing policy was lifted by the Coast Guard due to the threat of tropical storm 'Quinta' that hit parts of Eastern Visayas on Sunday(Oct.25).

Based on the report of the Coast Guard based in Allen town, about 668 passengers, bound for Luzon, were stranded in the three terminals since Sunday-Bhalwartico with 255 passengers; Sta. Clara with 373 passengers; and Dapdap with 40 passengers.

The Department of

Public Works and Highways in the province has also reported that all major roads and bridges were not affected by the heavy rains spawned by Quinta.

However, a portion of Calbayog-Catarman the Road was temporarily rendered impassable after a minor landslide hit in the said area with about 20 cubic meter of rocks cascaded from a hilly portion to the road. Clearing operation was immediately conducted by the DPWH.

Several parts in Calbayog and Catbalogan cities and in Mapanas and Catubig towns, both in Northern Samar, also experienced flooding due to the heavy rains dumped by

Ouinta.

Also, four fishermen from Rapu-Rapu town in Albay were rescued off the waters in Barangay Cahayagan, Laoang town, also in Northern Samar.

The rescued fishermen were identified as Michael Bilon, Jessie Adornado, and Rico Alamil. However, seven fishermen were said to be missing.

In Biliran province, two of its major bridges sustained damages due to Quinta's fury.

The Caraycaray Bridge, however, is now passable although only one of its lane while the Catmon Bridge remain not passable.

'Botika ng Bayan' to operate in Eastern Samar town

TACLOBAN CITY-People of Arteche town in Eastern Samar will soon enjoy cheap prices of medicines.

This will happen once the 'Botika ng Bayan' will start its operations which will offer quality but cheaper medicines compared to privately-owned pharmacies.

Mayor Roland Boei Evardone said that the public pharmacy will start its operation once the needed medicines supplied by the Department of Health (DOH) arrives.

The operation of the Botika ng Bayan in Arteche, the first of its kind in the province, is funded by the DOH which will

While it is the DOH that will supply them the medicine, the local government unit will maintain the pharmacy.

Starting Oct.23, Calbayog City placed under MGCQ due to rising COVID-19 cases

TACLOBAN CITY-Amid the increasing cases of its coronavirus disease (COVID-19), the entire city of Calbayog was placed under Modified General Community Quarantine (MGCQ) effective October 23 until revoked.

The new quarantine status of the city is contained under Executive Order Number 35 signed by Mayor Ronald Aquino.

The city government has deployed 20 personnel at the city proper to monitor the residents' compliance to the order under the EO and basic health protocols against COVID-19.

Violators of the protocols will be penalized from P500 to P1,000 and community service for at least 16 hours for individuals while business establishments will be penalized from P2,000 up to P5,000 and suspension or revocation of their business permits.

Under the MGCQ, individuals are prohibited to leave their homes except during medical emergencies or when such individuals is so allowed by the IATF (Inter-Agency Task Force).

Mass gathering is also strictly prohibited, including outdoor exercises, and liquor ban is also imposed in the affected areas.

Business establishments can operate in full capacity from 5 am to 8 pm except for those related to wellness and personal grooming which can operate up to 50 percent of its venue capacity.

Restaurants and other food establishments are also allowed to operate up to 50 percent of its venue capacity, while hotels, inns, and other accommodation facilities can continue their operations provided that they have certificate of authority see Starting /page 6 ...

More than P16 million infrastructure project now serves Abuyog town; seen to enhance economic activity amid pandemic

PALO, Leyte - The infrastructure project constructed in Abuyog town, this province, is now serving the residents in the area.

Leyte Governor Leopoldo Dominico L. Petilla told this during an interview adding that the bridge project inaugurated in the early part of this year serves as a

vital link of the farm-tomarket-road (FMR) in one of the barangays in the municipality.

He said that the project is a series of box culvert bridge worth P16. 95 million located in Barangay Taligue.

Petilla explained that the bridge, which forms part of the FMR, is now serving the farmers in the

area for the transportation of farm products to the market.

Petilla added that the bridge is also helping the residents in the nearby areas for their day-to-day transportation.

"The bridge which serves as link of the FMR provides better transportation not only for the constituents of barangay

Taligue but also the residents of the nearby villages of the town of Abuyog," the governor said.

Southern Leyte mayor signs order prohibiting use of karaoke, videoke to avoid distractions of students attending their online classes

TACLOBAN CITY The municipal government in Sogod, Southern Leyte has banned the use of videoke and karaoke and other sound and video amplified devices that could distract students during their distance and online classes.

The executive order, issued by Mayor to 5 pm in order to Jose Ramil Golo, is in response to the order of Interior Secretary Eduardo Año early this month for all local government units to enact ordinance that will ban videoke and other loud noise during hour of online class. Aside from noises coming from videoke and karaoke, Año also urged vehicle owners to avoid unnecessary blowing of horn during class hours This is to avoid distraction to pupils and students and for them to concentrate on their online classes, school works, and

other school-related activities while inside their respective home.

"All persons and establishments are hereby prohibited in operating the videoke/karaoke system and other amplified audio/video devises and other noisy activities from 8 am avoid unnecessary distraction that will greatly disturb the students while doing their school works at home," the EO states. But the use of these devices will be allowed from 5 pm to 8 pm, subject to the condition that it will not cause loud and disturbing noise among the neighborhood, the EO added. The order takes effect Monday (October 26) and will remain effective unless it is revoked, repealed or modified, it added. (ROEL T. AMAZONA)

Teen yields 'shabu,'

TACLOBAN CITY- A 16-year old boy was arrested on Friday (October 23) for alleged possession of illegal drugs and a firearm following an alarm and scandal incident here in the city.

Police identified the suspect as an out-of-school youth, single, and a resident of the city.

Seized from the teenager were a caliber .22 revolver loaded with two live ammunition, one piece heat-sealed plastic transparent sachet containing suspected shabu with esti-

Flood-prone



hether we like it don't, some urban centers in Eastern Visayas are indeed prone to flooding, not just because of a poor drainage system, but due to their geographical lo-

cations, that is why they should be taken into consideration by city planners and lawmakers.

During heavy rains when abundant water is poured on land, upstream lakes fail to hold much of these waters, releasing them downstream through rivers and creeks, cascading on the mountains and hills before reaching and eventually joining the seawater below. Upon reaching the plains, the bulk of water is distributed to a certain level based on the plain expanse that there is to accommodate arriving water. The wider is the plain, the less likely that floods will occur there.

So if a town or city happens to be situated in a vast plain, then the chances of floodwater engulfing the place is slim. But if it is found in a narrow valley in between huge and clustered mountains, then the likelihood of onrushing water passing through that place is very likely. Such is the case of Catbalogan City, the capital of Western Samar. Heavy downpours on its surrounding mountains eventually form rushing flood water that easily overwhelm the drainage system, hence the street flooding that results.

No amount of drainage rehabilitation could solve that recurring problem. So long as the floodwater from the mountains is allowed to reach the city, that problem will persist. The only viable solution to it is to create a huge canal around the city that could receive much water from above and detour the same directly to the ocean, instead of allowing the water to reach the city and its thoroughfares. But such a project would take enormous funds that, again, may just fatten the pockets of corrupt individuals instead of permanently solving the problem.

With this solution close to impossible, urban towns and cities in similar geographical locations will continue to bear with this headache that when torrential rains come, street flooding occurs, thanks to the local lawmakers who do not stop finding ways on how to handle this extant problem in their locality.

then we have to amend this again," Yaokasin explained.

Ordinance No. 17 Series of 2020

Sponsor: Hon. Harlan A. Tomenio, Sr.

Be it ordained by the Sangguniang Bayan of San Jose, Northern Samar in session assembled that:

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE PRESENCE OF ASTRAY ANIMALS IN ALL PUBLIC PLACES WITHIN THE MUNICIPALITY OF SAN JOSE, NORTHERN SAMAR, AUTHORIZING FOR THIS PURPOSE THE ESTABLISHMENT OF CARANGIAN POUND AND THE COLLECTION OF FEES FOR THE USE THEREOF, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

WHEREAS, Section 16 of Republic Act No. 7160 otherwise known as the Local Government Code of 1991 provides that: Every local government unit shall exercise the powers expressly granted, those necessarily implied therefrom, as well as powers necessary, appropriate, or incidental for its efficient and effective governance, and those which are essential to the promotion of the general welfare. Within their respective territorial jurisdictions, local government units shall ensure and support, among other things the xxx promotion of health and safety xxx;

WHEREAS, the Municipal Government of San Jose, Northern Samar is committed to protect the health and well-being of its citizens, while at the same time ensure that responsible ownership and humane treatment of animals be practiced;

WHEREAS, improper and irresponsible care and protection of domesticated animals pose a grave threat to the safety and security of our constituents;

NOW THEREFORE, after thorough deliberations and discussions and upon motion of **HON. ELECTORADO P. SOMORAY, JR.** with secondment of **HON. HARLAN A. TOMENIO, SR.**, this Sangguniang Bayan in session assembled hereby ordains that –

SECTION 1. Title – This ordinance shall be known and cited as "Anti-Astray Animal Ordinance of the Municipality of San Jose, Northern Samar".

SECTION 2. Definition of Terms – As used in this Ordinance, the following definition of terms shall apply, to wit:

a. **Astray animal** – refers to any domesticated animals such as dogs, cats, goats, poultry, rabbits, carabaos, cows, horses and the like without being accompanied by an owner or tamer at loose elsewhere roaming freely in public places within the municipality.

b. Carangian pound – a fixed enclosure complete with some personnel and facilities where animals found to be astray in public places within the municipality are kept or seized for the time being.

c. Domesticated - tamed or trained for household use.

d. Public Places – areas designated solely for public use such

also do the capturing and commit the same to the Carangian Pound;

b.) Immediately after such animal has been committed to the Carangian Pound, the Municipal Agriculture Office shall cause the finding of the whereabouts of its owner and/or tamer. S/he shall cause such owner and/or tamer to be formally notified of the capture and detention of his/her animal and thereby direct such person to forthwith claim the same. Said owner and/or tamer shall be made to pay the prescribed fees required for the release of his/her detained animal as provided for under Section 7(d) hereof;

c.) It shall be unlawful for any person charged with the custody of captured astray animals to maltreat, torture, poison or inflict any suffering or harm to such animals. This prohibition applied to any private person. This prohibited act is penalized under Section 9 hereof;

d.) No farmer or non-governmental organization, people's organization who was chosen as beneficiary of the astray animals as provided for under Section 5[©] hereof shall dispose of, sell, maltreat, torture or kill such animal, except if the killing/slaughtering is permitted under the law;

e.) It shall be unlawful for an owner/tamer even if s/he accompanied the said animal/s to urinate or poop in public places.

SECTION 5. Disposal of unclaimed animals

a.) All animals found to be astray shall be seized and impounded at the Carangian Pound until such time that the said animal is properly claimed by person(s) purporting to be its owner and/or tamer or until time that such animal is sold to any interested parties after seven (7) days following notice to the owner of its capture or after seven days from notice as provided under Section 5 (e);

b.) All unclaimed astray animals at the Carangian Pound are entitled to proper custody, care, shelter and sustenance;

c.) No such animal shall stay detained at the Carangian Pound for more than fifteen (15) days after notice to the owner or notice to the public as provided under Section 5 (e) hereof. If astray dogs, cats are not sold to any interested party within the same period, the same shall be offered to any duly accredited Non-Government Organization (NGO)/People Organization (PO) or animal lovers for care and proper disposition. In the case of poultry, rabbits, horses, cows, carabaos, goats, the same shall be turned-over to the Municipal Agriculture Office for proper disposition to deserving farmers for this purpose, if there be any. The beneficiary NGO/PO or farmer, as the case maybe, is prohibited from disposing, selling, maltreating, torturing or killing of the said animal, except if killing/slaughtering is permitted under the law;

d.) The Municipality of San Jose, Northern Samar shall have the right to auction any unclaimed animals detained at the Carangian Pound, the proceeds of which shall accrue to the coffers thereof. After seven (7) days following notice to the owner or tamer thereof or notice as posted in accordance with Section 5(e), the animals detained at the Carangian Pound shall become eligible for auction to any interested parties if the same remained to be unclaimed by the owner and/or tamer, or that no person purports to be its owner or tamer;

e.) The Municipal Agriculture Office which has charge of administering the Carangian Pound shall make public the list and picture of all unclaimed animals and their corresponding general description which shall include their kind, breed, color, markings if any, and their characteristics for the information and interest of all concerned. The list and picture shall be posted at said office, lobby of the municipal hall and other barangay halls of all barangays of the municipality. Upon the capture of the astray animal, it shall likewise immediately post a written notice on the aforesaid places which notice shall contain the kind, breed, color, markings, if any, and other characteristics and requiring the owner or tamer thereof the claim the astray animal within seven (7) days from date of notice. For proper identification of animals, the Municipal Agriculture Office in coordination with the Barangay should conduct an animal survey for every household and consequently inform the owners to register their respective animal.

SECTION 6. Establishment of Carangian Pound and Purchase of Impounding Cage/Vehicle

a.) There shall be established as Carangian Pound at which captured astray animals shall be kept for the time being;

b.) There shall be an Impounding Vehicle that will carry the impounded animal/s to the Carangian Pound;

c.) The Barangay is encouraged to have an Impounding Cage to serve as temporary Impounding area while waiting for the impounded

of the Provincial Veterinarian, after conducting regular diagnosis to each, shall have the exclusive discretion to order the segregation and seclusion of any such animals found to have afflicted by contagious diseases either at the time of its findings or during detention. Should an animal die during detention, the same shall be buried in a place and manner that the health and safety of the public are not endangered;

c.) The Municipal Agriculture Office shall prescribed for the regular/daily dietary consumption and supplements of all animals detained at the Carangian Pound, taking into consideration the capacity of the Municipal Government to provide of such necessities and requirements. Should an animal due during detention, the same shall be buried in a manner and place that it should not endanger the health and safety of the public;

d.) All animals at the Carangian Pound shall be released to their respective claimants only upon showing of proof that they are owners or tamers and upon payment of an Impounding Fee in the amount of Three Hundred Pesos (Php 300.00) per day of detention per animal, regardless of kind, breed or size.

SECTION 8. Disbursement of Impounding Fee – Fees collected and accumulated as a consequence of the enforcement of this Ordinance shall be held in trust by the Municipal Government of to be allocated only for the purpose of financing the maintenance and operation of the Carangian Pound, or other activities relative thereto.

SECTION 9. Penalty – Any person found to have violated this Ordinance shall pay a fine of:

First Offense – Fine of One Thousand Pesos (Php 1,000.00);

Second Offense - Fine of Two Thousand Pesos (Php 2,000.00); and

Third Offense – Two Thousand Five Hundred Pesos (Php 2,500.00) and/or imprisonment of not less than one (1) month but not more than six (6) months depending upon the discretion of the court.

SECTION 10. Repealing Clause – All ordinances, rules and regulations, or part thereof, provisions of which are in conflict with, or contrary to the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed, amended and modified accordingly.

SECTION 11. Separability Clause – If, for any reason or reasons, any part or provisions of this Ordinance shall be held to be unconstitutional or invalid, other part of provisions hereof which are not affected thereby shall continue to be in full force and effect.

SECTION 12. Effectivity Clause – This Ordinance shall take effect after posting in a public and conspicuous place in all sixteen (16) barangays of San Jose, Northern Samar.

as municipality streets and national highways within the municipality, public plazas, public market, public schools and other as may be designated by virtue of an ordinance or statute.

SECTION 3. Declaration – Pursuant to Article 100 paragraph (a), of the Implementing Rules and Regulations of the Local Government Code, it is hereby declared that:

a) All municipal streets and other public places within the municipality shall be free from astray animals;

b) Owners of dogs, cats, goats, poultry, rabbits, carabaos, cows, horses and other domesticated animals shall keep such animals within their household; and

c) Any violation hereof shall be penalized as prescribed hereto or in accordance with other applicable laws.

SECTION 4. Prohibited Acts

a.) No person shall allow or neglect his/her animal to wander or go astray in all public places within the municipality of San Jose, Northern Samar. If his/her astray animal is captured and kept in the Carangian Pound, and s/he fails to claim it within seven (7) days from notice for such purpose, s/he is liable for the penalty provided for under Section 9 hereof. Relative to this, the Police assigned in San Jose Police Station, Barangay Officials and Tanods are hereby deputized to capture any animal found to be astray and to immediately commit such animal to the Carangian Pound. Any other person may

animal/s to be carried to Carangian Pound wherein the said animal/s shall be transferred by the Municipal Agriculture Office within the day of impoundment;

d.) The Carangian Pound shall be situated at a definite site within the Municipality which environment is conductive and not harmful to animal health and safety. Such site shall be determined and designated by the Municipal Mayor and shall not be contrary to the Zoning Plan or Zoning Ordinance of the Municipality;

e.) The Carangian Pound shall be administered by the Municipal Agriculture Office and shall consists of facilities necessary to properly carry-out the purpose and functions of an animal pound;

f.) Fund necessary for the establishment and operation of the Carangian pound and purchase of Impounding Vehicle shall be appropriated in the Municipal Annual Fund Budget or any appropriation ordinance, subject to the pertinent provisions of Republic Act No. 7160 otherwise known as the Local Government Code of 1991, and other applicable, laws, rules and regulations.

SECTION 7. Custody and Release of Astray Animals

a.) The Municipal Agriculture Office shall be responsible to secure for the life, health and safety of all animals detained at the Carangian Pound;

b.) To insure the general welfare of animals detained at the Carangian Pound, the Municipal Agriculture Office with the assistance

Mayor Agda imposes hard border lockdown as Borongan logs two new COVID-19 cases

TACLOBAN CITY-Mayor Jose Ivan Dayan Agda has placed Borongan City under hard border lockdown beginning Sunday (Oct. 25).

The hard border lockdown, which will be in effect for nine days, is for purposes of extensive contact tracing, Agda said as he signed Executive Order 006-1020.

The order came into effect as the city recorder two new cases of COVID-19 of which the city government is now conducting contact tracing of their close contacts.

Under the order, only essential travels will be allowed in going to and from the city, including travel

by government employees, medical and health emergencies, and other necessary travels to purchase food and medicine.

The entry of food

items, basic goods and commodities will not be hampered despite of the border hard lockdown but during the delivery of these goods, only a maximum of five personnel including the driver would be allowed to enter the city.

Also, a maximum of 10 individuals from each municipality within Eastern Samar province, excluding authorized persons outside their residence (APORs), will be allowed to enter the city daily.

Throughout the nine days, all forms of mass gathering, and drinking in public is prohibited, and restaurants and other food related business will only allow and accept takeout orders.

Tourism sites, wellness and personal grooming establishments are also temporary close.

All public transportation from other municipalities are also not allowed to enter the city not unless they have authority from the local police station in their town.

The city government also imposes curfew from 8 pm to 5 am. (ROEL T. AMAZONA) NFA Region 8 readies rice stocks for calamities

TACLOBAN CITY – The National Food Authority (NFA) has enough stocks of rice in case local government units will need more supply in preparation for typhoon season in the latter part of the year, an official said.

NFA Eastern Visayas regional manager Arlene Tanseco said current stocks in NFA warehouses will last until early 2021 based on current demand for government rice in the region.

"Our transport facilities in different regions are ready to deliver stocks if in case Eastern Visayas needs more. But for now, our inventory is enough to supply the requirement this typhoon season," Tanseco told the Philippine News Agency in a phone interview.

As of Friday, NFA warehouses have stored 209,424 bags of rice.

Among provinces, Leyte has the most stocks with 59,774 bags, Samar with 44,708 bags, Northern Samar with 37,377 bags, Eastern Samar with 32,803 bags, Southern Leyte with 28,076 bags, and Biliran with 6,686 bags.

"Our inventory will last for about seven days if NFA is the only source of rice in the region, but that is not the case since we have a lot of rice kept by private traders and households especially this harvest season," Tanseco added.

As of Oct. 21, the grains agency has already procured 19,158 bags of palay (unhusked rice) from local farmers this May to October cropping season, nearly triple the volume purchased in the same harvest season last year.

Tanseco said more farmers sell their produce to the government this harvest season due to low trading prices offered by millers.

The NFA buys clean and dry palay at P19 per kilogram, up from the P12 price set by private traders.

Wet palay can be dried for hours in the compound of NFA buying stations through solar pavements.

Tanseco has encouraged rice farmers who benefitted from government assistance to sell at least 10 percent of their produce to the NFA to ensure the availability of quality staple food to local consumers during off harvest months. (SARWELL Q. MENIANO/ PNA)

Stakeholders to review Eastern Visayas tourism plan

TACLOBAN CITY -

Tourism stakeholders in Eastern Visayas would go back to the drawing board to come up with a short-term plan, taking into consideration the impact of coronavirus disease (COVID-19) pandemic to the industry.

Department of Tourism (DOT) Regional Director Karina Rosa Tiopes said that the health crisis' impact would compel them to come up with one-year to twoyear plan for local touritors since March. Tourism is the most affected industry by these movement restrictions. We don't know when will this end unlike Super Typhoon Yolanda wherein our tourism businesses managed to reopen after a week," Tiopes added.

At least three hotels in Leyte have formally notified the DOT of closure while several accommodation facilities sought an authority to operate from tourism department, but remained closed due to local government restric-

Eastern Samar, Leyte, Northern Samar, Samar, and Southern Leyte, and the cities of Baybay, Borongan, Calbayog, Catbalogan, Maasin, Ormoc and Tacloban, the Eastern Visayas' regional center.

Among its popular destinations are Kalanggaman Island, San Juanico Bridge, Leyte Landing Memorial in Leyte; Sambawan Island in Biliran; dive sites in Southern Leyte; Calicoan Island in Eastern Samar; Sohoton Cave and Natural Park in Samar; and Biri Rock Formations in Northern Samar. The region remains relatively under-the-radar compared to other tourist destinations in the Philippines, but this has been slowly changing in the past years as demand for raw nature tourism grows, according to Tiopes. More and more people visit the region in pursuit of rugged coasts and landscapes, secret caves and waterfalls, and fascinating histories. (SARWELL Q. MENIANO/ PNA)

Eastern Visayas sees slower economic growth in 2020, hopes for 'faster recovery'

While Eastern Visayas will experience a slower growth this year, the region could recover faster because it is less dependent on tourism.

The agriculture sector remains the strength of Eastern Visayas with the pandemic having lesser impact on the tourism and manufacturing sectors, said Leyte Governor Leopoldo Dominico Petilla. country can also rise from the economic downturn.

"There is a forecast from the World Bank that it will take for economies to recover, about three to five years (before returning) to 2019 levels. We are dependent on the rest of the country, including Cebu. So, our recovery will depend on the recovery of the In 2018, the economy of Eastern Visayas grew by 5.9 percent due to accelerated performance of services sector.

The services sector accounted for 44.4 percent of the regional economy. About 53 percent of the region's labor force is employed by service providers.

On the other hand, the industry sector and agriculture contributed about 41.6 percent and 14 percent to the regional economy as of 2018. Domingo recalled that Region 8 had managed to create more job opportunities with the expansion of economic activities and consequently improve its poverty rate. But the pandemic crisis might have reversed this trend now, he said. The region is composed of the provinces of Leyte, Samar, Biliran, Southern Leyte, Eastern Samar and Northern Samar. (OPAV/PIA)

"We have to consult with stakeholders since it is not any more realistic to follow the 15 percent annual growth rate. We might go back to the 2011 projections of seven percent annual growth in arrivals," Tiopes told reporters.

For 2020, the DOT expected to breach the two million mark in arrivals for Eastern Visayas or a growth of 15 percent from the previous year's tourist receipts.

"Practically, we are almost zero this year since we don't have vis-

tions.

Under the 2017–2022 Regional Tourism Roadmap, industry players are eyeing at least 1.31 million to 3.23 million annual tourist arrivals.

From a 6 percent to 7 percent annual growth target, stakeholders increased it to at least 20 percent annually for both domestic and foreign guest arrivals.

In 2016, the region ushered 1.22 million visitors, a significant increase from the measly 365,000 arrivals in 2011. The region consists of the provinces of Biliran, "Tourism in the Visayas is focused on Western and Central Visayas. Agriculture remains our strength," said Petilla during the online conversation Mugstoria Ta aired on the Facebook page of the Office of the Presidential Assistant for the Visayas.

Among the three regions in the Visayas, Region 6 is much less dependent on tourism as an economic driver, he pointed out.

Petilla noted, however, that the region's economic recovery would highly depend on how fast the

Philippine economy," the governor said.

Petilla, however, noted that Eastern Visayas could recover in about two to three years faster than the World Bank's projection.

Before COVID-19, Eastern Visayas has registered economic gains in the past years, said Amelito Domingo, supervising economic development specialist at the National Economic and Development's Authority (NEDA) in Region 8. "Before COVID, our growth trajectory was quite

growth trajectory was quite strong as evidenced in our GRDP (gross regional domestic product)," Domingo said.

Biliran police camp to be named after a Cabucgayan native

NAVAL, Biliran- After 23 years of establishment of the Biliran Police Provincial Office (BPPO) without any distinctive name like other police provincial offices in the country, soon it will have a name of its own after the joint members the BPPO's Technical Working Group (TWG) and the Provincial Advisory Council (PAC) passed Resolution No. 5 naming the police provincial camp after a Cabucgayan town native.

The BPPO Headquarters located in Barangay Larrazabal in Naval, Biliran will be named Camp Private Andres P. Dadizon as per TWG and PAC Joint Resolution No. 5.

This initiative was highlighted in the welcome message of PCol Julius M. Coyme, BPPO provincial director with the presence of the new Regional Director of the Police Regional Office 8, PBGen. Ronaldo F. De Jesus, in his visit to the BPPO on September 25, 2020.

The resolution mentioned that Dadizon was a native of Cabucgayan and a World War I veteran, who commissioned himself as an enlisted man of the US Army.

He died fighting with the US Army and has

In that battle, as pictured out in the resolution, Private Dadizon, although seriously wounded, was still able to plant the flag in front of the enemy's trenches, which display of courage bolstered the morale of his comrades, and fought the enemy fiercely until they had overrun the German position. He died on July 31, 1918 and was buried in San Francisco National Cemetery in San Francisco, California, USA.

In the 1930s, the Americans honored Private Da-

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dizon by naming a street after him in Tacloban City and erected a statue at the compound of the former Camp Bumpus inside the present Leyte Park Hotel, the resolution mentioned.

At present, a replica of the statue of Private Dadizon can be found in Barangay Bunga in Cabucgayan after several attempts made by former Cabucgayan Mayor Andres Igano in 1980 to bring the original statue after its displacement from its original location with the construction of the Leyte Park Hotel on that same year.

In 2004, the Biliran Historical and Cultural Society sent a petition to the Department of Tourism in Region VIII, seeking support for the retrieval of his original statue, the resolution stated.

The naming of the BPPO after his name is one way of giving honor and as an inspiration of the future generations to be proud of and worthy of emulation.
