

TACLOBAN CITY- At least a million individuals across the region are being targeted of the three-day vaccination campaign of the Department of Health (DOH) which started Monday (Jan. 31).

With this regional vaccination, the DOH expects that almost 100 percent of the total population of the region could receive the much needed vaccine against coronavirus disease (COVID-19).

Out of the region's more than 4.86 million people,

around 53.3 percent of them have received the vaccine either for first dose or second dose.

On Monday, the threeday regional vaccination drive started with the DOH reporting of 60 new cases of COVID-19, the lowest daily

the year.

Still, the decrease of new cases should not be considered that the COVID-19 cases in the region are slowing down, Jelyn Lopez Malibago, DOH regional information officer, said.

The 60 new cases for new cases since the start of COVID-19 was its lowest

since the start of the year which also saw the region posting a record-breaking 879 cases last Jan. 20.

Since the start of the year, the region posted its lowest daily cases on Jan.2 with just three cases. Since then, its daily cases have see DOH /page 9 ...

## **DOH turns over COVID-19** treatment facilities in Tacloban City and Samar province

TACLOBAN The Department of Health (DOH) has turned over two temporary treatment and monitoring facilities (TTMFs) in Tacloban City and Samar province amid the surge of coronavirus disease (COVID-19) in the

"While Tacloban City currently has the highest percentage of individuals vaccinated with at least one dose from its total population across the region, the TTMF would serve as an extension of the hospitals in the city in catering probable, confirmed, mild, and moderate Covid-19 cases," the regional health department said on Friday, January 28, 2022.

Dr. Rodolfo Antonio Albornoz, assistant regional director of DOH-Eastern Visayas, attended the ceremonial turnover together with the Provincial DOH headed by Dr. Antonio Ida, Tacloban Mayor Alfred Romualdez, Councilors Dr. Elvira Casal, Evangeline Esperas, and Aimee Grafil, City Health Officer Dr. Gloria Fabregas, and other health personnel.

Tacloban's TTMF, which has 16 to 18-bed capacity, is located at Bypass Road Barangay 91-Abucay while that in Samar has a 14-bed capacity and can be maximized to handle up to 25 beds and is located at the

Samar Provincial Hospital in Catbalogan City.

The ceremonial turnover was also attended by Albornoz, Samar Governor Reynolds Michael Tan, and other health officials and personnel of Samar Provincial Hospital.

According to the regional health department, the TTMF was constructed through the Bayanihan II Funds of the DOH-Eastern Visayas EVCHD, courtesy of the Health Facility Enhancement Program.

As of Monday, the total active COVID-19 cases stand at 2,354 with the additional 60 new cases.

## Boy, 7, dies due to snake bite in Biliran

ORMOC CITY - After washing his wound caused by a snake bite past 10 pm on Thursday(Jan.27), the 7-year old boy went to bed but did not wake up any-

Police Staff Sergeant Stanley Duran, the investigator on-case of Cabucgayan police station in Biliran, said that first-grader Jhon Mark Mollejon was walking home taking the grassy portion of the village road with his mother around 10 pm when a snake bit him off. He did not inform his mother until they arrived home.

As they reached their home in Barangay Magbangon in Cabucgayan, Biliran, the boy washed off with water a wound at his right foot believing it was the snake bite and later laid to sleep. His mother never thought it would be the last time she would talk with

After more than an hour of sleep, his mother, Era Nogas, noticed Jhon Mark's face turning black.

Alarmed, his family then rushed the boy to the Rural Health Unit located at the same village to seek medical help. However, Dr. Julieta Tan, the attending municipal health officer, declared him dead, the police continued.

The police later reported that the boy was bitten on his left arm, which confirmed the doubts of his mother that what they first believed the wound at his right foot was only a bruise he sustained after a quick jump when the snake swiftly bit him up.

Earlier that day, Jhon Mark and his mother went to his grandmother, Lorna Mollejon, as she was to celebrate her birthday.

## Popcom sets blueprint for special protection program for teen mothers

TACLOBAN CITY-The Commission on Population (Popcom) here in the region is keen on piloting the Social Protection Program for Mothers and their Children (Sppamc).

Thus said its regional director, Elnora Pulma, who stressed that the program will offer an 'opportunity' to adolescent mothers.

"What we are offering with the program is an opportunity for our adolescent mothers to continue to a better life including their children

and not the discrimination they often experience after giving birth at a young age," she said.

The program offers social protection for adolescent mothers and their children by providing continued opportunities for education, access to health services, and other assistance to safeguard a better quality of life for them and in the process reduce the incidence of poverty and other vulnerabilities.

An estimated P33 billion in potential lifetime

income for teenage girls is lost due to early pregnancy and compounded when there are repeat among pregnancies these teen moms, according to the agency.

In an earlier statement, Popcom said the situation "can adversely affect their future and potential and without proper interventions such as the Sppamc, they could be trapped into a vicious cycle of intergenerational poverty."

### **DPWH** in Leyte's second district prepares big-ticket projects for this year

TACLOBAN CITY -The Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH) - Leyte Second District Engineering Office is set to carry out a total of 57 infrastructure projects amounting to over P1.38 billion under the CY-2022 DPWH General Appropriations Act (GAA).

Among these projects are four preventive maintenance; 21 widening/rehabilitation/reconstruction/ upgrading of damaged paved roads - primary/tertiary roads; one construction of bypass roads; two construction of missing links/new roads; 11 bridge programretrofitting/ strengthening of permanent bridges; 11 flood control systems; six multi-purpose buildings

and covered court; and one completion of Leyte 2 DEO office building.

OIC-District Engineer Leo Edward Oppura reported that 97.77% of these projects have been bid out and are ready for award.

Once awarded to the contractor, he advised the project engineers and contractors involved in the project implementations to prepare the necessary documents and immediately start the project upon issuance of Notice to Proceed (NTP).

"It is necessary to start the project implementation so that delays will be avoided especially now that the COVID-19 pandemic is still a threat in the workplace," Oppura added. (LIZBETH ANN A. ABELLA)

## Rain or shine

We

can hardly tell whether it's good news or not at all, but according to the Philippine Atmospheric, Geophysical and Astronomical Services

Administration (PAGASA), almost the entire country will still be experiencing the La Niña weather phenomenon, which increases the likelihood of above normal rainfall, in the next three months.

But this forecast does not guarantee enough rainfall to all. In fact, PAGASA advised residents in the Ilocos region, the Cordilleras, much of Central Luzon, Occidental Mindoro and Palawan to save water because they are forecasted to have below normal and way below normal rainfall during the same period thus, the reserves in the Ambuklao, Pantabangan and Angat dams will be affected.

But for the rest of the country, it forecasts a near normal to above normal rainfall because of easterlies and shear lines and possible low-pressure areas or tropical cyclones. At least one tropical cyclone is expected to enter the Philippine area of responsibility each for February, March and April. PAGA-SA said no weather system is expected to enter the country in the next five days but most of the Philippines will have partly cloudy to cloudy skies with scattered rain showers and thunderstorms.

Based on our experience, too much rain is rather destructive especially when it's already causing floods and mudslides in low-lying areas. But this same phenomenon is just tolerable, even advantageous, in areas where sources of potable and irrigation waters are located. Normal rains are sometimes not enough for these dams to get filled, hence their need for heavy and prolonged downpours.

But the dry season and the tendency of drought is not beneficial either. We are not a desert country wherein prolonged dry seasons are but normal. As an agricultural country, our plants cannot survive under long droughts, hence our need for rain. It follows, then, that for us to have a normal existence and daily chores, we just need a balanced dose of sunshine and rain. Beyond these, we get headed for disasters.

#### ROWENA AMELIA V. GUANZON (Bida o' Contrabida?)

(DEPENDS ON WHICH SIDE OF THE POLITICAL FENCE OUR READER IS IN.)

Born 64 years ago on 29 August 1957, Atty. Ma. Rowena Amelia V. Guanzon finished law at the University of the Philippines & took graduate studies at Harvard University in the US.

On her personal life, the unmarried Comelec Commissioner Guanzon said "I chose to be single, because I am a feminist; having grown up in a family where women are strong. We were not compelled to get married. We were not encouraged to get married, and neither were we discouraged to get married."

At only 28 years of age, Atty. Amelia Guanzon was appointed by President Cory Aquino O.I.C. City Mayor of Cadiz City, Negros Occidental; a position she was duly elected to, after her stint as officer-in-charge.

Appointed as a Commissioner at Comelec by President Noynoy Aguino on 28 April 2015, she's about to finish her 7-year stint at the Institution; and on the side, was unofficially known as the "Fiery Commissioner" of the Commission on Elec-

Guanzon's term at the Comelec expires 2 February 2022, on the day copies of this Leyte-Samar Daily Express newspaper are released to the public. She is the last Aquino-appointed Comelec Commissioner.

The Six (6) other Commissioners were appointed by President Rodrigo Duterte, including Chairman Sheriff Abas, Antonio Kho, Socorro Inting, Marlon Casquejo, Aimee Ferolino & the newest appointee, Rey Bu-

Three (3) Comelec Commissions will on 2 February 2022 -- they are Chairman Sheriff Abas, **Commissioner** Antonio Kho and Commissioner Rowena Guanzon, the presiding commissioner of the Poll's First Division, under which Petitions vs Bongbong Marcos are being held.

"All lawyers must be inside the premises before 8:55am. Parties must personally appear with their Vax Cards & Face Masks."

"In the interest of public transparency, the mainstream media will be admitted for Five (5) minutes, or until the joining of Issues is finished and before their exhibits are marked."

"These are the Petitions filed on November 17, 2021, by the organizers of the 'Campaign Against the Return of the Marcoses & Martial Law' by the supposed officials of Marcos' Partido Federal ng Pilipinas and by martial law survivors led by Akbayan, which were filed on December 2, 2021.

That choice has plunged them, being pure spirits, into an irreversible eternal state of enmity against God and against everything else comes from God and is still with God.

Many if not all the temptations that come our way originate or are being orchestrated by devils. The proper attitude we should have when temptations come is to reject these temptations immediately, never giving them a chance to advance in their plot by dialoguing with them, and to go to God immediately.

Let's remember that when temptations come, it is because we have let down our guard. It means that our union with God has loosened, if not completely broken, often without even our noticing it.

openly asked "Alam ba ni presidential aspirant Bongbong Marcos that Partido Federal ng Pilipinas (PFP) is threatening me --- the presiding commissioner, while his case is pending? Baka e-contempt ko kayo at ipakulong ko kayo sa Manila City Jail!"

(This was declared due to the First Division's supposed delay in the announcement of the Marcos Disqualification Case.)

Guanzon believes that there was "interference" in the decision, causing its delay. She then said "Now, they already know my vote. They think that if I retire, my vote will not count, which is not true!"

## SSS urges FB followers to utilize online portals and facilities

The Social Security System (SSS) encourages its more than five million Facebook (FB) followers to actively utilize its portals and various online facilities including its social media platforms for easier access to SSS information, services, and transactions.

President and Chief Executive Officer Aurora C. Ignacio said that the SSS made available its My.SSS Portal on its website www.sss.gov. ph for members to have exclusive access to their contributions and membership records, facilitate online transactions, set appointments with their servicing branch, and request for copies of their records, among others.

Over the last few years, the My.SSS Portal has undergone enhancements and now includes online applications for loans, benefits, requests for member data change (simple corrections),Payment Reference Number (PRN) generation, and enrollment of disbursement accounts.

"The majority of our FB followers interact with us by writing queries and making follow-ups in the comments section of our official FB posts and the SSS Social Media Services Section is in charge of responding to these concerns. As we encourage active social media engagement, we also invite them to maximize the usage of the My.SSS Portal since benefit claims and loan status are readily available in their respective accounts. Likewise, they may also reach us through the FB Messenger where a Chatbot can respond to their basic and frequently asked questions," Ignacio said.

Members and employers may also use the SSS Mobile App, with similar features and may be downloaded via Google Play Store, Apple App Store, or Huawei AppGallery for free. They may also avail of the Text-SSS facility via 2600 with a service fee of P2.50 per transaction for Globe, Smart, and Sun Cellular subscribers.

Aside from My.SSS Portal, the SSS also launched in November 2020, the ExpreSSS e-Learning (ExSSSeL) Portal which allows participants to learn the different SSS policies, programs, and updates at the comfort and safety of their homes. The ExSSSeL Portal is a free online computer-based training wherein participants may choose among the modules, study at their own pace and time, take the post examination to assess the learnings gained, and receive an e-certificate

upon obtaining a passing rate of at least 80% in the post examination. Members and other individuals can visit said Portal via http://bit.ly/ExSSSeL Portal. After selecting a module, they will receive an online registration form via Google Form for them to fill out. Multiple modules can also be accessed simul-
